

ANN STEELE GOES INTO FIRST PLACE IN QUEEN CONTEST

A political upset in yesterday's voting, which left the American Legion service clubs, Southern Pacific and Elks club wondering what its all about in the contest for the throne of Queen Susannah II in the Sunset Trail present.

Ann Steele, previously lagging in third place for many days, had landed in the lead when the votes were counted, checking in with a total of 543,707. She gained 34,000 votes during Friday's voting, pushing Mary Gierhart out of the lead.

Claire Curtis, also lagging up to yesterday, nabbed the second place with a total of 10,000 bonus votes by polling 167,002 new votes yesterday, bringing her count up to 561,922. Only 2000 and a few votes separate her from the lead.

Mary Gierhart now holds third position in the race for the queen's throne, with a total of 557,942, and a mere 5000 odd votes stand between first and third place in the race, which puts the three leading candidates within close fighting distance of each other.

Bertha Waldorf with a total of 860,291 is in fourth place, but with the S. P. picnic coming up tomorrow Monday will very likely tell a new tale.

Each organization has been building up a reserve of votes against the final stretch of the race, and the first three days of next week will see a constantly shifting vote as the ballots are thrown in.

James K. King has issued the edict that from this evening, when today's count will be completed, until Wednesday night at eight-thirty o'clock, no further reports on queen standings will be given out. The reports Wednesday, which is the final night of the contest, will be given at the queen's election ball and continue until the count is completed.
