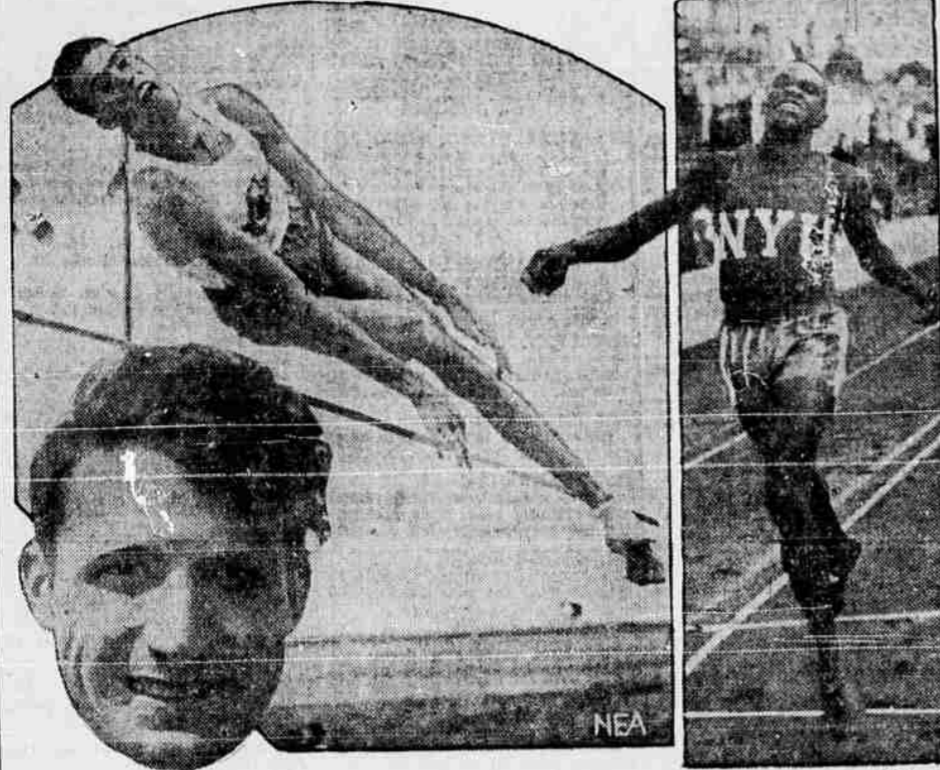

**DICK NEAR LEAVES
SUNDAY FOR JUNIOR
GOLF TOURNAMENT**

Eugene's lone hope for the Oregon state junior golf championship, Dick Near, 17 year old masher, leaves for Portland Sunday in order to get acquainted with the tournament course before the 15 hole qualifying round Tuesday morning. The third annual tournament for the junior championship of Oregon will be played over the Multnomah Golf and Country club course.

Last year Near, one of the four Eugene boys entered, was medalist, shooting a 72 on the difficult Tualatin course. The junior championship was finally won by Johnny Robins of the Alderwood Golf club of Portland, who will not be able to defend his title this year for he is past the 18-year age limit.

Ted Gardner, Eugene Country club professional, has been training Near all year and says that his protegee has an improved game to show at Portland this year and that his playing is becoming more and more steady. Gardner looks for Near to bring the title back to Eugene.

None who has only been playing golf for about two and a half years has been shooting the 18 on the Eugene course regularly in 72, 73 and 74.

Last year 103 Oregon junior golfers entered the tournament, which is in charge of the professionals of Portland and held every year under the auspices of the Oregon State Golf association.

The girls junior tournament will be held at the same time and on the same course. Frances Scott of the Waverly course in Portland will be back to defend her title.

**FRISCO SEALS NOW
TOP COAST LEAGUE**

San Francisco's Seals, struggling hard to regain lost laurels, forged to the top of the Pacific Coast League in yesterday's second half series battle. The Seals, with ten victories to their credit and two games lost, displaced the Los Angeles Angels, with whom they were tied for first the day before. Hollywood occupied second place, and the Angels were now tied for third with the Mission Reds.

The Seals put over their seventh consecutive triumph over the Oakland Oaks in the Eastbay ball grounds to clinch the week's schedule. The score was 8 to 0.

Portland was nosed out by the Mission Reds at Recreation Park by a score of 5 to 4 in 12 innings of intensive competition. Scott, running for Baldwin in the twelfth, scored on Finn's single. The Reds led from the first inning until the ninth when Portland tied up the count. Nelson pitched the entire game for the Reds. Casarola replaced Chesterfield for Portland after the sixth, and Mahaffey finished.

Eleven innings of warm scrapping were necessary to decide Sacramento's victory over the Los Angeles Angels by a 4 to 3 score in the capital. The Hollywood Stars made it four in a row over the Seattle Indians at Los Angeles, by a tally of 11 to 0.

YAQUI JOE WINNER**

It all comes under the heading, "too bad." Just when Eugene wrestling fans were witnessing the fastest and cleanest wrestling bout ever held in the armory, Mervin Barackman, middleweight wrestler of Seattle, fell full length, striking his chin on one of the iron pieces in the corner, knocked his chin over the lower jaw and received the full weight of Yaqui Joe, Sonora, Mexico, sensational Indian grappler, on his back. A vertebra in his neck and one in his back were dislocated. Yaqui Joe then took two straight falls in as many minutes, winning the match.

Perhaps the best man won. Perhaps he didn't. Both wrestlers were game and clever. Barackman carried the fight to Joe all the way until his accident and downed the Indian with a punishing Boston crab hold for the first fall in 30 1/2 minutes. Joe doesn't know the meaning of the word "nut" and even in the back-breaking crab hold he refused to slip the canvas. McIntosh, Joe's manager, tried to get out of them. When about 21 minutes of the second crabs had passed, Barackman again almost had the Indian into a crab hold but Joe extricated himself, tripping Barackman who fell face down, injuring himself.

It took Joe less than a minute to turn Barackman over and pin his shoulders to the mat. Barackman came back after the rest period but was in no condition to wrestle and

**LEADERS IN MAJOR
LEAGUES TAKE EASY
WINS FROM ENEMIES**

Favorites in the two major leagues had nothing but a breeze yesterday, save the case of the Giants and the Cubs who played each other. The young man of John McGraw rallied in the last two rounds to pull this one out by 4 to 3 in ten innings, and the Pirates gained a full game on the Bruins by the simple process of giving the Phillies their daily beating, 6 to 1. The Pirates now lead by three games.

Cornelius McGillicuddy spread gloom in St. Louis by leading the Athletics to a double victory over the Browns by 10 to 9 and 8 to 2 and at the same time added a technical half-game to his lead over the Yankees who crushed the White Sox by 12 to 2. The Mackinnon margin now is eight and one-half games, seven of which are in the last column which baseball folk regard as money in the bank.

The Giant-Cub game was the most stubbornly contested battle of the day, with Larry Benton shading three Chicago rivals by a whisker at the finish.

Burleigh Grimes gave the Phillies thirteen hits at Baker Bowl, but as usual, was stung with runs. Two three-run outbursts by his supporters were sufficient to bring him his first win in that no batsman cleared that right field wall.

The Cardinals gave Brooklyn fans an intimate demonstration of why the champions no longer are in the race. The St. Louis slugs, headed by Dazzy Vance for five runs in the first half of the ninth to break a 2 to 2 stalemate, but promptly proceeded to give the game right back to Brooklyn in the home half. Three St. Louis errors, four passes and three hits enabled the Robins to score six runs with one out to win by 8 to 7.

She Cincinnati Reds fought their way to within a few percentage points of an escape from the cellar by late-succeeding afternoon. The Reds rallied behind Rixey for two runs in the ninth to tie, and won by 4 to 3 with a single marker two innings later.

The Tigers rallied for four in the ninth to win a weird game from the Athletics by 13 to 12, and the Indians shaded Washington at Cleveland by 3 to 2.

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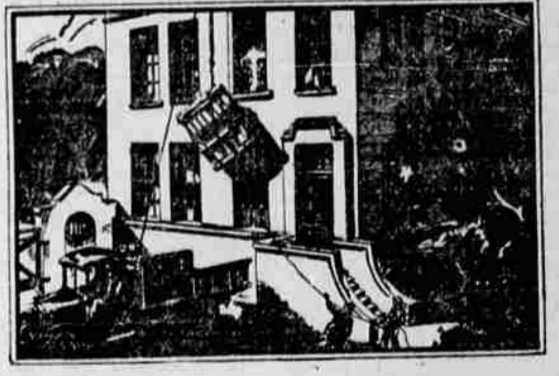
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
