

PUBLIC UTILITIES LEAD MARKET IN UPWARD MOVEMENT

NEW YORK, July 30.—(AP)—Bear traders, apparently having failed in their efforts to force heavy liquidation of stocks, stood aside today and the market rallied in crisp fashion under the leadership of the public utility shares. A few weak spots cropped out here and there but they were disregarded. Pools resumed buying operations on a broad scale lifting scores of issues 2 to 7 points, and sending a few specialties soaring 10 to 20 points.

Call money renewed at 10 per cent against 9 yesterday, but there appeared to be sufficient funds available to hold the rate at that figure until the month end credit stringency had passed.

The closing was strong and total sales approximated 2,700,000 shares. The closing sales on the market were:

KREAMER SERVICE TO BE WEDNESDAY

Funeral services for the late Edwin A. Kreamer, well-known Civil war veteran who passed away Monday, are to be held on Wednesday afternoon, July 31, at 2 o'clock at the Walker-Poole chapel. Rev. J. Franklin Haas, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, officiating.

Members of J. W. Geary post, Grand Army of the Republic, of which Mr. Kreamer was adjutant for a number of years, will be in charge at the chapel and the I. O. O. F. lodge of which he was a member will be in charge of services at the graveside. Interment will be in the old I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Kreamer resided at 951 Twelfth avenue west. He had lived in Eugene 19 years. Born in Pennsylvania in 1845 Mr. Kreamer served in Company D from Pennsylvania in the Civil war.

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and of the I. O. O. F., Rebekah, Woodmen of the World, and G. A. R., and was especially active in the G. A. R. during his residence in the city.

The survivors include two daughters, Miss Cora Kreamer of Eugene and Mrs. Lottie Meathers of Tulsa, Oklahoma; and one son, M. L. Kreamer of Lake Charles, Louisiana, formerly a Eugene jeweler.

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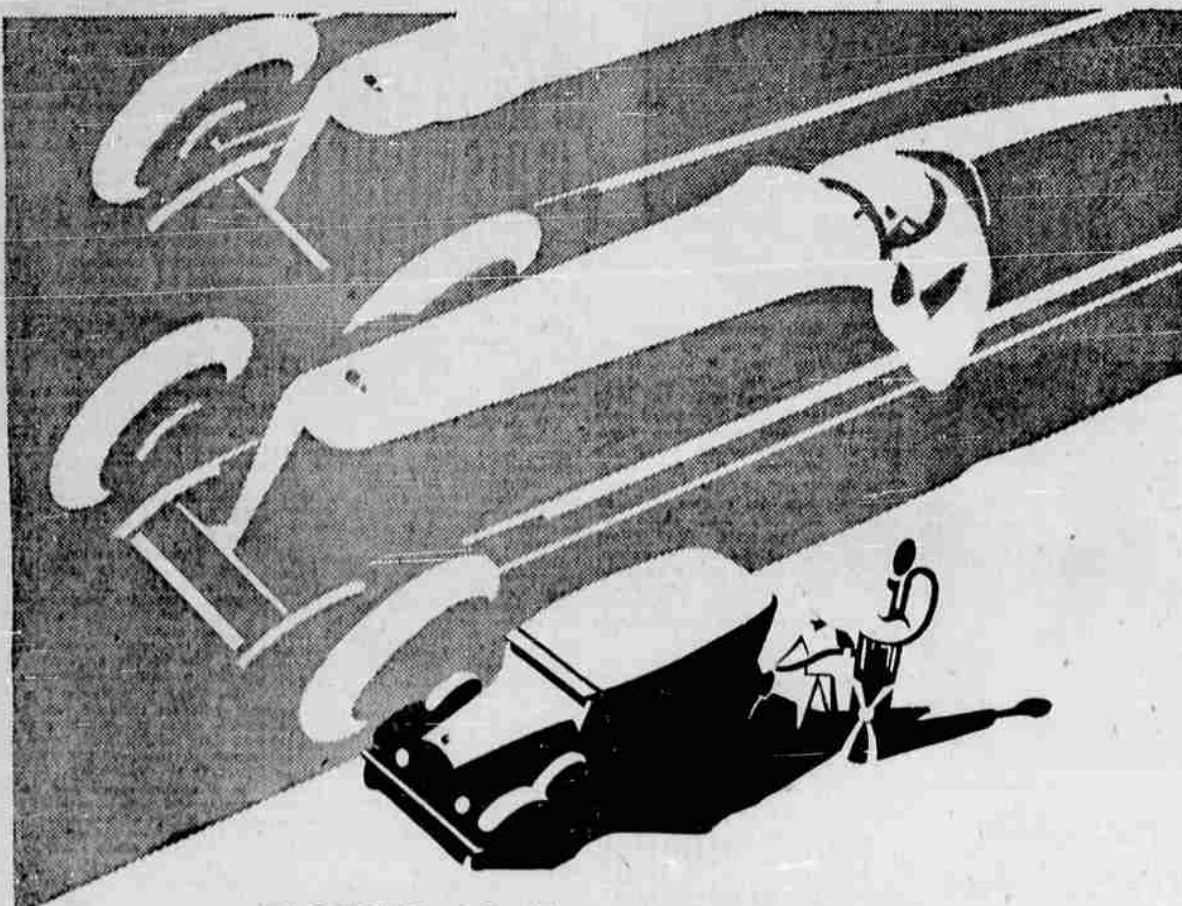
