

DESCRIPTIONS HERE FOR GLENADA WORK

The descriptions of pieces of land needed for the right of way of a section of the Roosevelt highway 12 miles in length from Glenada south were received by the county court on Thursday from the state highway commission.

Work on securing the rights of way will be started immediately, according to Clinton Hurd, county commissioner. Thirty-four parcels of land will be required for the highway, according to the blue-printed descriptions. The largest of these is 240 acres, and most of them are under one acre. The smallest is six square feet.

HIGHWAY MEN SEE LANE COUNTY JOBS

Robert W. Sawyer, member of the state highway commission, Roy A. Klein, chief engineer for the state highway department, and J. S. Sawyer, recently resigned from his position as division engineer, motored through parts of Lane county Wednesday and Thursday to look over projects in which the state highway commission and the county are jointly interested.

Arriving at Florence by way of Waldport, the officials looked over the location south of Glenada where 1.7 miles of the Roosevelt highway will be put under construction soon, and then motored up the river road to see the proposed route of the Siuslaw highway.

The men did not stop at Eugene to visit the county court but went on up the McKenzie to see the new bridge at Vida and other projects.

While at Cushman, the highway officials talked with Earl Hill. They reported that "everything is going along fine on the Siuslaw work." Judge Sawyer said that he saw no real difficulties ahead in completing the water level route.

MARY WHITE BRIDGE CHANGE SETTLED

Arrangements for the right-of-way for the relocation of the Mary White bridge over the Coast Fork of the Willamette river on the London Springs road south of Cottage Grove have been concluded by the county court, according to C. P. Barnard, county judge.

The viewers report listed the amount of damages on the White property at \$400 and damages of \$300 on the Madenier premises.

The new bridge will be a covered affair of wood construction and will be placed a few hundred feet down stream to take out three sharp curves on the road.

Local Man Invents Two Safety Devices

Two new safety devices which promise to reduce the hazard of foggy weather to a minimum and give the pilots of airplanes positive knowledge and the proximity of mountains at all times have been invented by Royal V. Howard, chief engineer for State Airway Corp., Glendale, Cal., and formerly of Eugene.

The first invention is a beacon of the infra-red species devised to penetrate fog. These are to be placed along the airways of the nation. These rays will be picked up or "seen" by special photo-electric cells aboard

40 PASTORS ATTEND CONFERENCE HERE

Forty ministers are in Eugene attending the Bible Standard conference which is being held in connection with the large coast camp meeting at the Lane county fair grounds. The conference has been taking up ways and means of financing home and foreign missionary work.

Four foreign missionaries of this faith are in the field at the present time; two in Hawaii, one in India and one in South Africa.

The minister's conference began on Tuesday and will close Sunday when the camp meeting ends. Rev. Fred L. Herakshala, pastor of the Lighthouse temple and presiding elder of the conference, said Thursday that ordination of ministers takes place Sunday. The ones making application have not been named as yet, the pastor said.

Thursday night's speaker will be Evangelist Owen Lee, known as the Irish Evangelist of Los Angeles. On Wednesday evening the speakers were Rev. and Mrs. Cornelius Schmidt, who leave for India on missionary work as soon as the meetings are over.

U. S. Employment Bureau is Moved

The United States employment bureau which has been located for the past year at the north end of Willamette street has been moved to a new location. The office now stands at 30 Sixth avenue west.

F. L. Armitage, superintendent of the station, was busy Thursday getting the office ready for business. The labor conditions in Eugene at the present time continue to be good, Mr. Armitage said, with skilled loggers and road construction hands most in demand.

ENTRIES COMING IN FOR COUNTY FAIR

Entry of a flock of sheep from the Waldo Hill stock farm of Silverton, Ore., where some of the best stock in the state is grown, gives further assurance of a first class exhibit of stock at the Lane county fair, August 21, 22, 23 and 24. Floyd F. Fox, of the Silverton farm, has written C. B. Swango, stock superintendent of the fair, assuring him that the Silverton animals will be in the pens when the fair judging starts.

Stalls are rapidly filling up and it looks as if the fair livestock exhibits will be better than ever before, according to Michael H. Chadwick, secretary of the fair. Not only are the best Lane county herds to be represented, but animals will be brought in from many points outside the county. Sheep, goats, cattle, horses and hogs will be exhibited.

Mr. Swango has been appointed stock superintendent, succeeding Raymond Johnson, who was unable to continue the work. E. A. McCormack, for many years livestock superintendent at the fair, found it impossible to take charge of the work this year, but is lending his assistance and cooperation to Mr. Swango, Mrs. Chadwick stated.

With the fair only three weeks away, plans are progressing rapidly under Mrs. Chadwick's direction. Space is being taken up rapidly for industrial exhibits in the main pavilion and in the new industrial building, and industrial exhibits undoubtedly will be better than at any previous fair, she said.

The whole fair organization is now intact and working steadily to make the big late summer exposition a great success. Mrs. Chadwick has been busy on fair plans all summer, and the fair premium list which she prepared has won wide acclaim among fair and livestock show men throughout the state.

ELEVATOR CONTRACT GIVEN OTIS PEOPLE

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—The state board of control today awarded to the Otis Elevator company the contract to install elevator equipment in the new state office building. The company's bid was \$11,250. The contract was contested by the Portland Elevator company whose bid was \$11,000, seeking the contract under an Oregon statute providing for a differential of 5 per cent in favor of Oregon concerns.

The board has employed William Laing of Salem as inspector of construction of the building to represent the state. Laing was inspector for the state in the construction of the state training school at Woodburn, the eastern Oregon insane hospital at Pendleton and the state tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles. He was formerly Salem city building inspector.

Eugene Aviators Go to Air Jubilee

Two Eugene aviators, H. H. Hobb of the Hobb Airways, and Harold Sanders, will go to the Lewis Proctor air jubilee in Vancouver, Wash., August 14. They will fly a Travelair monoplane which they will enter in the air derby.

The derby is being held as a welcome to Lewis Proctor who is returning to his home in Vancouver from Europe. Proctor was the national scale model contest which resulted in the European trip. He will return to Vancouver by airplane.

Oberteuffer Goes To Ohio State Job

Dalbert Oberteuffer, director of physical education for men at the University of Oregon, resigned his post Wednesday to accept a position as supervisor of health and physical education for the state of Ohio. He will begin his work at Columbus, Ohio, September 1.

During the past year Oberteuffer has been working for his doctor's degree at Teachers college, Columbia university. He received his B. A. from the University of Oregon in 1923 and his M. A. from Columbia in 1924. While at the University of Oregon he was a track star for three years and a yell leader for two years.

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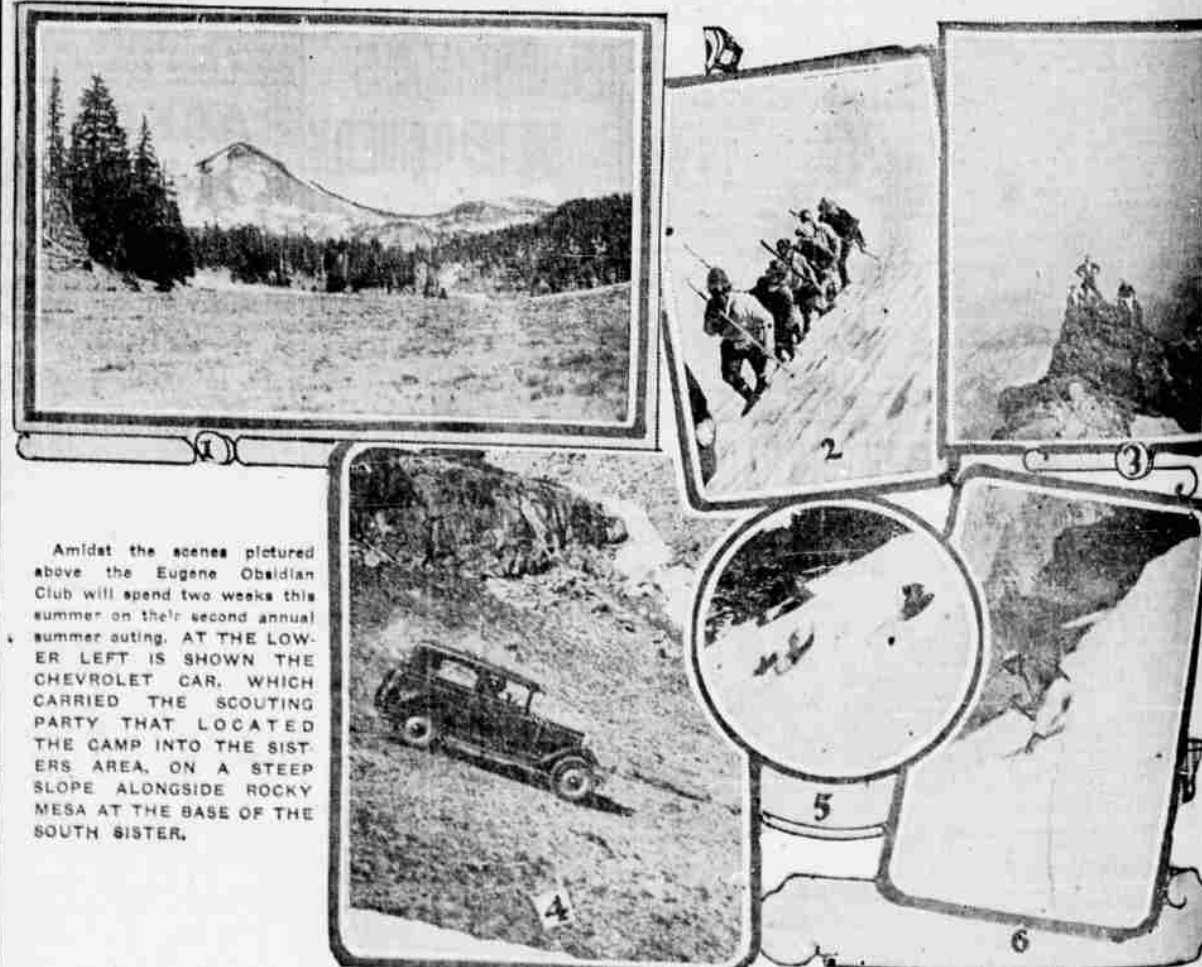
