MARKETS CHANGE LITTLE THURSDAY

FIRST PEARS AT PUBLIC MARKET

The first of the early pears were in Thursday at the Producers' Public Market, selling at 5c a pound.

Early pears are more plentiful and some of the varieties are of excellent quality. They continue to retail at 30c a basket.

There were a number of changes in vegetable prices at the market Thursday. New potatoes are slightly cheaper at 2 1/2c a pound, 10 pounds for 25c.

Green peppers are selling down to 15c a pound.

The green and wax beans are generally selling now at 5c a pound.

New corn is very plentiful at the market but no change in price is reported, the various varieties selling from 15c to 20c a bushel.

All varieties of blackberries are selling now at 5c a box.

Red raspberries and logans are very scarce at the market now, the former selling at two boxes for 25c, the logans at three boxes for 25c.

Strawberries continue at two boxes for 25c.

Head lettuce is coming in better right now, best grade quoted up to 10c a head.

Green apples are a bit cheaper, selling generally at 4 1/2c a pound Thursday.

Cucumbers and the pickling cucumbers continue plentiful and unchanged in price.

Dry onions are more in evidence. The Bermuda continue at 5c a pound. Other dry onions continue around 4c a pound. The tiny pickling ones remain at 5c a pound.

A few of the Mount Morancie cherries are still on the market, selling at two pounds for 15c.

Fresh lima beans continue at 5c a pound. The horticultural beans are quoted at three pounds for 25c.

MARKETS CHANGE LITTLE THURSDAY

BEANS, PLUMS AND BLACKBERRIES DOWN

Slight declines in buying prices on vegetables and fruits were the main changes in the local markets Thursday.

Peach plums have dropped to 2c a pound, buying price.

Green beans are flooding the market with result prices are somewhat lower. The Kentucky Wonders are quoted down to 4c and the Blue Lakes continue at 6c a pound.

Green apples are lower, listed at 2 1/2c a pound, buying price.

Blackberries are down, stores listing them at 1 1/2c a dozen, buying price, Thursday.

Local stores are beginning to buy more of the local dry onions, quoting them at 4c a pound.

Other fruits and vegetables were unchanged. Thursday. Logans, blackberries and red raspberries are about off the market.

Eggs, poultry, butter, butterfat, and grains continued steady.

BELO HORIZONTE, Brazil (AP)—For the first time in Brazil a real secret ballot was used in the elections here recently to choose a member for the municipal council. The government candidate was defeated by Dr. Nagesha Drummond, professor of law at the university and the candidate of the students.

This state of Minas Geraes is the first to change its constitution to legalize the secret ballot. In the past it has been the custom for a voter to write the name of his choice in the presence of the election officials, then place it in an envelope and deposit it in the ballot box.

GERMANY'S TOWNS USE YANKEE WAYS BUT BERLIN LAGS

BERLIN (AP)—The frequently emphasized Americanization of Germany is even more marked in the provinces than in Berlin. While in the German metropolis the introduction of the moviehouse film has been and still is accompanied by considerable first-class heated opinion, and can be advanced even before its consummation, this screen innovation has been quietly accepted in the provinces where tone film cinemas are springing up like mushrooms.

Famine gossip in the German small towns no longer discuss their neighbors' affairs, but Greta Garbo, Clara Bow or Jack Barrymore. The provincial corner grocer and the apple woman, adopting American advertising methods, daily carry a large sign with aphorisms, witty ad-vice and hymns to stimulate the sale of their goods.

Even in the clothing department of the small and only dry goods store in the town of 1,000 inhabitants, there is a periodical fashion show, with a real live manikin in the show window.

Speaking of one's car has become a matter of course and there is a tendency to judge a person's intellect by his ability to spot the make of an automobile at first glance.

Every well-to-do provincial town in Germany has also its sport stadium and the shrieks and howls of the spectators differ only in numbers from those manifested in Madison Square Garden during a big fight or hockey game.
