

GRAF ZEPPELIN IS INVITED TO VISIT OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Raymond B. Wilcox, president of the Portland chamber of commerce, today cabled Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the rigid airship Graf Zeppelin, inviting him to pay an aerial visit to this city and Oregon.

Previous news dispatches indicated the zeppelin would reach America either in Alaska or Seattle and sail down the coast to Los Angeles.

TOKIO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—A windless and almost cloudless oriental sunset today pledged the assistance of the elements for the start of the Graf Zeppelin's flight across the greatest of oceans from Tokyo to Los Angeles.

Just before midnight engineers completed the refueling of the airship. Stores, lubricants and foodstuffs were stowed away for the longest overseas flight yet attempted by any craft. The distance across the Pacific is estimated at 5,100 miles, requiring about 160 hours of flying.

Dr. Eckener and the craft's high officers all were expected at the Kasumigaura, which has seen many would-be world fliers come and go during the past few years but only one successful group, the American army world fliers of 1924, is pervaded with a thrill of expectancy evoked on no previous occasion.

The interest has been intensified rather than diminished during the zeppelin's brief sojourn. Apparently there is a feeling among the population that this is an opportunity to witness history in the making, so general is the assurance that the zeppelin will complete its world circuit successfully.

Definitely assured that this would be their last day ground in the orient, passengers and crew of the Graf busily engaged in shopping during the brief intervals between formal entertainment.

Dr. Eckener himself joined the shoppers but tried without success to purchase a ready-made white suit as relief from Tokyo's humid heat. He found Japanese ready-made clothes all too small for him.

Agents of the Hamburg American line said they have rejected forty applications for the trans-Pacific passage at \$2,000 each.

Weather experts report areas of depression near the Bonin islands and Siberia but these are not likely to affect the zeppelin's start.

A following wind is promised for the first part of the flight and if the prediction is realized the flight across the northern Pacific is expected to be easier than the trans-Asian journey.

Great crowds massing the borders of the Kasumigaura air field indicate there would be even greater excitement surrounding the Graf's departure than there was when he arrived on Monday, this despite the fact that she will leave early in the morning.

GRAF STOCKS UP WITH LIQUOR CHOICE JAPANESE WINES ARE OBTAINED MAY KEEP SUPPLY OVER U. S.

TOKIO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Before starting her Pacific flight the Graf Zeppelin's stores were enlarged in Japan by 50 quarts of champagne and a like quantity of whiskey and liquors.

No beer was stocked here, the Graf preferring to carry her own brew around the world.

The point has been discussed here whether the zeppelin's "cellar" will be emptied before the coastline of the United States is reached. If not, the problem may arise of how high in the air prohibition extends, together with other questions of enforcement on international air liners.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Such part of the liquor placed in the Graf

Zeppelin's "wine cellar" in Tokio, today as is not disposed of by the passengers on the way to Los Angeles will not have to be dumped overboard.

The same customs and revenue rules apply to the dirigible as to any other ship and the Graf established a precedent about treatment of its liquor stores on its last flight from Friedrichshafen to Larchmont, N. J.

On that flight champagne and spirits were carried and such bottles as were not previously emptied into glasses were sealed in bond when the ship passed over American territorial waters. As the Graf flies at an altitude of between 10,000 and 20,000 feet the question of a vertical three mile limit is not apt to come up for consideration.

FORGERY CHARGES PLACED AGAINST 2

The district attorney drew two informations Wednesday afternoon charging Ralph Brubaker, 18, and Orville Nevers, 16, with knowingly uttering and publishing forged bank checks.

The two were arrested late Tuesday afternoon on the streets of Eugene by deputy sheriffs. The youths confessed having passed forged checks at Medford, Portland, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Springfield and Eugene.

Word received by authorities Wednesday afternoon from the secretary of the Portland Bankers association stated that thousands of dollars was believed to have been received by the pair from banks over the entire Willamette valley and in southern Oregon.

Sixteen checks were passed upon the United States National bank of Eugene. They were signed "John Maughan," Maughan is a Lane county rancher. The checks were all between five and ten dollars in denomination.

Authorities said Brubaker had been confined in the state training school and on a previous occasion had broken parole and was returned. He was recently released. Deputy sheriffs said that he admitted being in trouble on check charges before.

Checks amounting to about \$300 have been received by the district attorney. Others are thought to be out in large number.

Service stations, grocery stores, and drug stores were the victims of the check passing.

You can't miss the Eugene Garden club's exhibit on beautiful roses. It's just outside the main building and shows graphically how beautiful and valuable scenery can be marred and

GAS PLANT BLAZE STARTLES EUGENE

A gas plant blaze that sent clouds of smoke rolling over the business district startled Eugene late Wednesday afternoon and caused the fire department considerable trouble before it was extinguished.

The blaze was in the plant of the Northwest Cities Gas company (formerly owned by the Mountain States Power company) on Eighth avenue east near the mill race.

Employees said a spark from the boiler room dropped into tar behind the boilers and started a fire which burned off the roof which covers the boiler plant and part of the roofing over the storage tanks. A broken hose coupling delayed the fight with the flames but the damage was slight.
