**Former Eugenean Here**—Mrs. Nathaniel Aaron of Portland, formerly Annie Howard, executive secretary of the Lane chapter of Red Cross, was a visitor in Eugene Tuesday morning with her brother, Benton Howard. Mr. Howard will leave Aug. 30 for Telic, Spanish Honduras, where he is employed by the United Fruit company in the shipping of bananas.

**Parties of students**, under the direction of Dr. Wren D. Smith, professor of geology, went from Juneau to the famous Mendenhall glacier which was studied at close hand. Some of the more venturesome walked out on the huge river of ice and securely roped together examined crevasses and other features of the ice flow. With a river gushing full born from a deep marine bed cavern in the face of the ice, the glacier is one of the most thrilling sights to be seen anywhere in the world, students declared upon their return.

**Historic city of Skagway**, once a bustling, bustling community of 15,000 people, but now a village with but the ghosts of early gold rush days remaining, was enjoyed for an entire day. Several students and faculty members rode 40 miles into the interior via the White Pass and Yukon river railway, a trip that was crammed with thrills as the rail line wound up and around the mighty mountains. The line follows at many points the historic Trail of '88 over which weary prospectors trekked on their way to the gold fields back in the stampeede era.

**Skagway**, though but a ghost of its former self, still a place of romance and mystery. Its deserted saloon buildings all have their tales which "old timers" will recount. "Soapy" Smith, the smooth-tongued rascal who was finally shot for his rascality, still lives in story as absorbing as any ever told, while all about, hemming in the little valley with sheer beauty and majesty, are tall mountains that rise up until their snow-capped peaks touch the clouds in heaven.

**From the northern point of Skagway** the vessel came south to Sitka, ancient Russian capital of the territory.

**From Sitka** the S. S. Queen took to the open sea bound for the glacier bay region. This gave many students their first thrill of open sea voyaging and gave the majority their first sensation of sea sickness.

**Fishing parties** at Excursion Inlet, then stopped at Juneau, Petersburg, Wrangell and Ketchikan on the way home completed the cruise. Fair weather almost all the time was enjoyed.

**Students** make remarkable progress in every subject, instructed declared upon their return. Long hours on the waterway, free from noise and distractions, were very conducive to concentrated study and with seat added by the excursions ashore, no one had difficulty in keeping up in work.

**The cruise** was arranged by Campbell Church, Jr., of Seattle, and university work on board was under the direction of Karl W. Onthank, executive secretary of the university.

**A second cruise**, in a larger vessel and with a route that will include additional points of interest, is already being planned for next year. Mr. Onthank declared upon his return here.

# DEMONSTRATION OF HOME PROJECTS IN SEPTEMBER LISTED

With the canning demonstration season at an end, Gertrude Skow, Lane county home demonstration agent has projected a program of nutrition, clothing, basketry, and home planning for September.

Activities in the demonstration have been suspended during the fair week, but immediately after the exposition has closed work will be resumed.

Miss Skow announced the complete demonstration program for September Wednesday. The schedule includes meetings in all parts of the county. Miss Skow will be out of the county at times judging exhibits at county fairs.

The nutrition work includes the regulating of diets, planning of meals, and the application of the principals of meal planning to individual cases. The clothing project includes the construction of clothing, remodeling and other phases. Home planning and basketry are important divisions of the demonstration work.

Pacific northwest, feature writing, camera reporting and others.

# OPPOSITION VOICED TO WIDENING MOVE

The disadvantages which the proposed widening of Eleventh avenue east would cause to the residential district bordering the street would not be compensated by the advantages gained is the opinion advanced by W. F. Gilstrap.

Mr. Gilstrap, who lives at 608 east Eleventh, stated Wednesday that he had talked with a number of the residents along the street and that the majority of them are opposed to widening the street at the present time. No action has been taken by those opposing the move but counter petitions will be circulated if such a step becomes necessary, said Mr. Gilstrap.

There is no real demand for such a widening of the street at the present, he declared, as the city has four main arteries with which to care for the east to west traffic through the city in Eighth avenue, Broadway, Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues. Besides providing additional work for the paving

companies, the chief result of widening the street now would be to turn it into a speedway.

Residents along the street have taken considerable pains and pride in keeping Eleventh avenue east as one of the most beautiful streets in the city, the fine lawn and numerous large shade trees adding much to the appearance of the city. They are willing to widen the street when such a procedure is warranted but they feel that that time is not yet at hand, according to Mr. Gilstrap. Until then, they will fight to prevent such an occurrence.

Mrs. J. F. Gilbert, who has been active in promoting the widening project, announced Wednesday that nothing further has been done about circulating the petitions supporting the movement.
