

TABLET DEDICATED
TO BRITISH MAN

ZEPPELIN STORY

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A spanking breeze from the southwest came to the aid of the Gracie Zeppelin's engines today and drove the gigantic air liner at high speed toward the American coast.

But a host of wireless messages intercepted by eager radio listeners the position reports this morning indicated that the dirigible was making in excess of 80 miles an hour as she approached the international date line on her flight from Tokyo to

The friendly wind apparently had added more than 20 miles an hour to the speed of the aircraft at midnight Saturday night, ship's time (7 a. m. E. S. T.). The position report from the dirigible at that time showed it had progressed almost 100 miles in an hour.

As flying conditions gradually changed for the better the mistress of the air began to veer to the north and to follow the trans-Pacific airway, the easy, long path of the trans-Pacific steamships.

For the first 24 hours of her trip the Zeppelin held generally to an eastward course, giving the great dirigible a wide berth in order to follow the airway.
