

### MRS. THADEN WINS \$10,000 IN RACE

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Led by Mrs. Louise McPhetridge Thaden, winner of the first cross country derby for women, a distinguished company of aviatrices was entered in the 50 m.p.h. race over a closed ten lap course at the national air races here today.

Mrs. Thaden won approximately \$10,000 in prizes by finishing first in the women's derby from Santa Monica, Cal.

Phoebe Omlie, winner of the light plane division in the same race, also was entered, as were Thea Hasche of Germany, who finished second in the light plane class, and Lady Mary Heath of England, noted for her flight from London to Bagdad.

Race officials said the cross country fliers will have surpassed the most exacting tests yet given women pilots in overcoming the demands both of long distance and short course flying.

The famous golfer was quoted as having said that the film company would not offer that amount to another Atlanta attorney who had not won honors in golf and that he did not intend to capitalize on his game.

Jones, by profession, is a lawyer. He refused recently to accept a \$50,000 home offered by his admirers in Atlanta.
