

RED RIVER BRIDGE TO REPLACE FERRY

HOPE, Ark. (P)—Red river, historic and treacherous stream, soon will be spanned by a new bridge which will carry trans-continental motor traffic safely across one of the most dangerous flood points in Arkansas.

The new bridge, at Fulton, Ark., 24 miles west of this city and close to the Texas line, replaces one of the oldest ferries in the Southwest. Motor travelers who have slipped and slid down the caving banks of the Red after dark to find the ferry, remember it as one of the most thrilling passages in the west.

The new high level bridge with a 600-foot road will be opened next November. It is a part of Arkansas' \$100,000,000 system of paved highways, construction on which started in 1921.

Constructed as a state-owned toll bridge, the Fulton structure will cost approximately \$750,000, which motor tolls are expected to pay out and make a free bridge in from five to 10 years.

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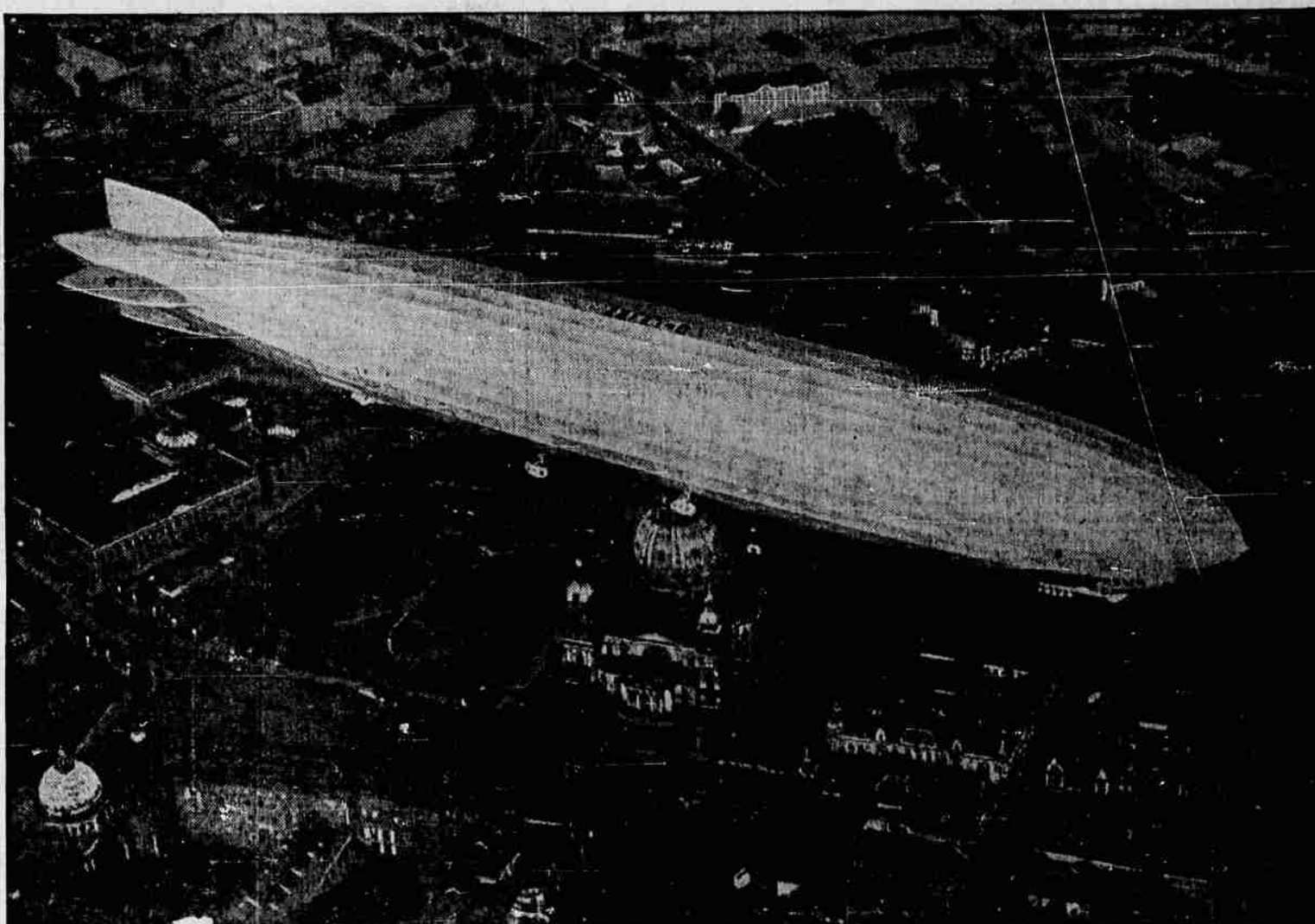
