TODAY'S RECIPE By SISTER MARY

EVERY woman likes to offer a long cool drink to the chance caller on a hot summer's afternoon. But if she must spend most of the minutes of the call preparing the refreshment, the visitor is uncomfortable and the visit a failure. This delightful, informal serving is often a real problem to the woman without a maid.

One solution is to keep fruit syrups on hand. Fruit not perfect enough in shape for canning can be used for this syrup as well as any juice left from a full-length black faille taffeta gown with unusual décolletage and shoulder straps.

Raspberry Shrub
Six quarts raspberries (red or black), 1 quart clear vinegar, granulated sugar.

Wash and pick over berries. Put berries and vinegar into a stone jar and let stand 36 hours. Keep covered with a cloth. Strain through a jelly bag and measure juice. Put into preserving kettle and add sugar. Boil for 10 minutes. Pour into sterilized bottles and seal. When wanted dilute with ice water.

All fruits can be used after crushing to extract the juice. They are canned with or without sugar and no vinegar. Sugar makes them simpler to use and helps in preserving the juice. One cup of sugar to four cups of fruit juice is the proportion to use. The mixture should be brought to the boiling point and canned and sealed boiling hot as in the open kettle method of canning.

can be diluted as the syrup can it is convenient to have on hand to combine with pure lemon juice. A bottle of fruit syrup always on ice makes it possible to make a refreshing drink in the twinkling of an eye. Water and cracked ice with three or four tablespoonsful of the syrup and the drink is ready like magic.

Raspberry shrub is invitingly tart, making an ideal thirst quencher and cooler. However, it is not as good a drink for children as plain lemonade or some other pure fruit juice. Grow-ups and those persons who would reduce their weight will especially appreciate the drink.
