Curved steel frames of extra strength are rising in many cities as skeletons for new shrines. An outstanding example is the Earthquake Memorial Hall under construction here on the site of the army depot where the holocaust of September 1, 1923, reached its worst. It will be crowned by a three tiered pagoda rising 135 feet and will be fire and quake proof.

Modern Facilities Aid Town's Growth

BERLIN.—(AP)—Germany may be a "man's country" but for all that, women are taking an increasing part in the legislative business. Of the 400 members of the Reichstag, 49 women, 32 are women, and 20 of these are social-democrats. Even a greater proportion of women sit in the Prussian Diet. Of the 400 members, 42 are of the fair sex, and again 20 of these are social-democrats. In the other states, Eve is less in evidence among the lawmakers. In Bavaria only 5 of the 180 members of the Diet are women. In Baden they number 7 out of 72; in Wurttemberg there are only 3 women parliamentarians; in a House of 80, and in Saxony, 5 of 96 deputies are women.

CASES SHIFTED

ROME.—(AP)—Juvenile offenders in Italy will in most cases hereafter be turned over to the National Association for the Protection of Maternity and Infancy, instead of being sent to reformatories or asylums. This decision was made by the government commission for penitentiary reform.
