How to Make Crisp Bacon Even More Delicious

TODAY'S RECIPE

WITH watermelons tempting the shopper from every market place, a few suggestions regarding some of the ways of using them may be useful.

As an appetizer or dessert, watermelon is refreshing and satisfactory for hot weather menus. A perfect meal can't be improved upon by anything else.

Thoroughly chilled and cut in circles or wedges, with the rind trimmed down to a pink, the fruit makes a delicious first course.

Sometimes a melon is not sweet and unless a little thought and care is spent on it, it will be wasted.

There are several ways to help out a tasteless melon. Neat cubes or small wedges can be allowed to stand in heavy syrup for one or two hours and then drained and chilled. A cherry dressing or orange juice and sugar will make the insipid melon into a delicious cocktail. The fruit might also be utilized in preserves and in sweet pickles if there is danger of its going begging.

Never use any portion of a watermelon that looks over-ripe. This is easily distinguished by the color and softness of the fruit. Over-ripe melon may cause some form of indigestion.

Home Pointers

Although high priced now this season's rhubarb can be canned to advantage as it is of good quality, and if canned now it makes a high quality article for the family larder.

The rhubarb is cut in pieces 1 to 1 1/2 inches long. It is then put into a strainer and blanched in boiling water for two minutes before filling jars. After the jars are filled a 40 per cent syrup is added, which is made by using four parts of sugar to six parts of water. Put the covers on loosely and set into water and boil for 15 minutes. Then remove, seal and cool.

Dear Mrs. Jordan:
I have two children—eight and ten years old, a boy and a girl. They seem to think a great deal of each other but quarrel so I can hardly stand it. I have tried moral suasion and punishment and nothing seems to help.

Is there anything I can do? They seem to enjoy to scrap whether or not another child does anything to either one the other is up in arms at once. Their father says I pay too much attention to them—that if I ignored them they would quit. I have tried, but I am so ashamed when any one is around and hears the commotion. I'll be very thankful for any help you can offer. MOTHER OF TWO.

Any answer:
If the two children enjoy playing together, it seems to me that the best possible discipline when they quarrel is to let the children by correcting them constantly in the presence of others.

Do not worry about what other people's children do. That only makes them and you self-conscious. And at any rate, most people have children, and those with children never dare to be too critical.

Do not let such things as the opinion of outsiders prevent you from carrying out a line of discipline, once you have begun, although I can sympathize with your desire not to humiliate the children by correcting them constantly in the presence of others.
