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SERIAL ON PROPHET SHOCKS YOUNG BOYS

CONSTANTINOPLE. (AP)—A Stamboul newspaper "Ikdan," owned by a group of Turkish deputies, is publishing a serial life of the Prophet Mohammed in which, probably for the first time in the history of Turkish publications, he is referred to not with the traditional title of respect "hazret-i" ("honored"), but simply as "that man."

In one chapter, for instance, he is "that man who, after having been faithful to one wife for forty years, found at the age of sixty, the need of taking unto himself three wives more."

Shocked comments are rife not only among the old-timers but also among young Turks, bred under the new regime, who say that while they do not care to partake in the old Moslem ritual and do not, for the most part, even attend mosque services, nevertheless they do still cleave to Mohammed as their prophet and as their ethical ideal.

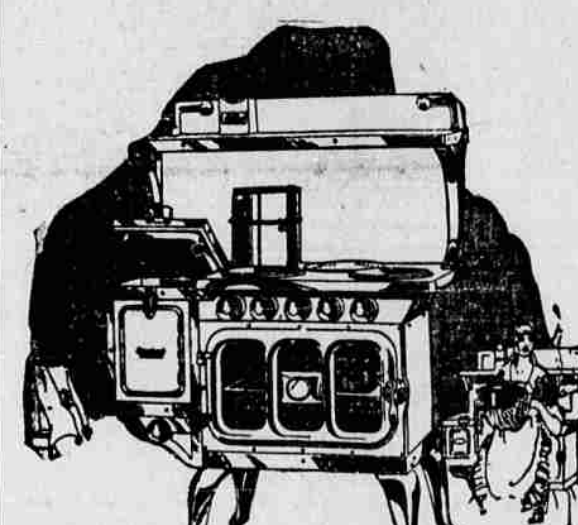
