TODAY'S RECIPE

CREAM PUFFS are made of what is technically called "choux paste." They are really a form of pastry and are peculiar in that they are twice cooked.

One of their chief merits lies in their excellent keeping qualities. They can be made several days before wanted but must be filled not long before using. This process is always simple.

There are many kinds of fillings, each one offering a different dessert. Since the shell itself is not sweet it need not be used exclusively for dessert but can take the place of a petty crust for creamed fish or meat. If grated cheese is added with the flour the case is good to hold salad as well as a creamed mixture.

Choux paste is the foundation for eclairs or cream puffs. The shape of the finished pastry is the only difference.

The following rule will make twelve medium-sized puffs. One puff is allowed for each person to be served. The only "rub" about making this paste comes with the beating. Each egg is thoroughly beaten into the mixture separately and the procedure requires muscle. However, the result justifies the effort.

Puff Shells
One cup boiling water, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup flour, 4 eggs.
Put butter and water into a smooth sauce pan. Bring to the boiling point and when bubbling rapidly add the flour which has been sifted all at once. Stir vigorously over the fire until the mixture leaves the bottom and sides of the pan. Let cool. This cooked mixture must be very stiff and perfectly smooth. When cool add one

Your Children

NEVER miss the chance to wander through a toyshop.

The other day, however, I had another thrill waiting for me that never had been waiting before—a small but real honest-to-goodness lawn mower with sharp blades that would cut real grass, stood in a swanky coat of gilt and red, and attracted my eyes.

Now I've seen the day not so long ago when mothers would have held up their hands in righteous horror at the idea of putting such a weapon into the hands of their children. Very likely they would have cried: "Why not give him a gun and be done with it?"

But it isn't so now.

Mothers know that as well as they ever did that little toes or fingers may get nipped, but they are learning in a larger way that it is part of a child's education for him to learn to take care of himself and the toy method is as good as any other.

Forewarning the Child
If Robert's mother buys him such a toy now, she'll say, "Look here, son, these blades are knives—real knives. You must never put your fingers near them for any reason, and keep your feet away from them, too. If you don't you'll be badly cut."

If Robert comes in one fine day with a nipped finger, she isn't going to take his new present away from him either. For she knows that the best lesson he can have is this very thing. She'll disinfect and tie up his hand and warn him again, and the chances are that there will be no more casualties.

There were other toys in the place that were quite as fascinating and in their small way, as risky as the lawn mower. "It shows the trend of the times," I remarked to the owner of the shop.

A Lesson in Toys
And the shop keeper, evidently up to date in more things than toys, answered, "Doesn't it, though? Toys are more than mere playthings in this age of mechanism, and there are all sorts of things manufactured to teach children safety—how to take care of themselves. Of course, hardly any of these toys could do you great amount of damage, but you can see for yourself that one could get quite a nice little shock from the electric set. Just enough sting to make a boy realize he'd rather not fool with the wrong end of it. Of course, these sets are not for babies, but for children old enough to be taught how to use them."

Then I examined the hundred and one types of airships to be put together, and all the ocean steamers, and the makings of every sort of sailing ship that ever braved the mighty main. A boy would be a regular ship builder when he got through.

A liberal education indeed for the boy, formal enough to own any one of them.

Toys are of two types—those that arouse emotion and sentiment, and those that teach.

We're getting away from the sentimental toys into the hard-headed class, because it's a hard-headed age.

Woman's Day

THAT there is one moral law for men and another for women is one of our most accepted convictions. "The double standard" is heartily believed in despite all protests.

A murder trial is in progress in Columbus, Ohio. The man fighting for his life was a professor in Ohio State university. He was accused of murdering a co-ventrator, Miss Theora Hix. University authorities really took his job away before this fact was known, and when only his admission that he maintained an apartment with the girl was known.

'Not One Fired
Another member of the faculty who was fired for knowing the dead girl not wisely but too well, was also told to look for another job.

The same university issued a statement to the effect that moral rectitude would be demanded from its staff with more searching out of personal lives than ever before.

A state educational association took up the subject declaring that teachers everywhere must submit to an intimate questionnaire and investigation designed to show whether or not their characters would permit them to be teachers.

What's It Mean?
Several questions lurk in this trend of affairs. One wonders if it really means that "the double standard" is being shot to pieces, and that we are demanding the same moral rectitude from men as women? That we are demanding more personal uprightness from everyone, both male and female, or that we simply get excited when things are found out?

It all seems a bit unfair when one knows that this younger man, about to marry another girl who lost his job for admitting his misconduct with the dead co-ed, had doubtless performed not a whit differently from a handful of other men on the faculty. But he got found out. They didn't.

'Noisiness
Besides, this whole tendency to subject teachers, both men and women, to personal investigation, and to workers in any other profession must undergo, can not help but reflect unfavorably on that profession.

The man or woman with the most upright character but with a little dash of pride may stop and look and listen a long time before he or she will enter a profession which makes so many demands upon the decent inalienable right to a little privacy.

Women Only!
It probably explains right now why teaching has never been considered a man's job, and why so few men are in it. Women have been forced by tradition to accept "going into their personal affairs without too much protest. Men never have learned, and probably never will. But teaching needs the right sort of men, too. It is preposterous to place all growing boys in the hands of women teachers, but that's just what it's coming to, if it hasn't already come.

'Young May Moon
Speaking of "noisiness," a charming new book by Martha (Henslow) called "The Young May Moon" is a perfect example of what community "noisiness" can do to a human soul. Marie Gunther quarreled with her husband, Zolf, one night and ran away from him. By morning she was back, repentant, to find that he had drowned himself. How she attempted to rebuild her life and fight morbid remorse, and how her life was ruined by the town's flimsy curiosity is the interesting theme of the book.
