

# Bobby Jones, Golf Wizard, Sets Pebble Beach Mark In Practice

## OPEN CHAMP ROUNDS REVAMPED COURSE WITH PARS, BIRDIES

DEL MONTE, Cal., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Leaving the Pebble Beach course to other amateurs practicing for the opening of the National Amateur Golf Championship here Sept. 2, Bobby Jones, king of the simon pures, shifted his play today to the Cypress Point course where he was to meet Francis Ouimet in an exhibition match.

Jones' left Pebble Beach with a new course record of two under par, which he established yesterday before a gallery of 3000, the largest ever to watch even a champion here. The champion's score was three under the mark of 73 set by Johnny McIlush, of San Francisco, and one under that shot by Johnny Dawson Tuesday.

Dawson, a Chicago golfer, was a semi-finalist this year in the British championship. He was reported to have withdrawn from the amateur championship yesterday after officials questioned his amateur status because of his employment as a salesman by a golf ball firm.

Scheduled to play with Jones and Ouimet at Cypress Point today were Henry Lapham, of Boston, and Roger D. Lapham, president of the California Golf association. Followers predicted a card in the sixties for the champion today as Cypress Point is conceded to be a much easier course than the revamped Pebble Beach links.

Bobby's showing yesterday was one to satisfy his most ardent admirer. The champion was out in 35 and in with the same number of strokes. Pars and birdies galore thrilled the large gallery which saw him playing with Cyril Tolley, British amateur champion, Phillips Finlay, young Redlands, Cal., and Francis Brown of Honolulu.

## BRUINS ASSAULTED FOR DOUBLE BILL BY BOLD PIRATES

The demise of the Pirates was prematurely announced, according to no less an authority than Joseph V. McCarthy himself. The leader of the Cubs takes on that to Buccaners not only were alive as recently as yesterday afternoon, but also were raiding the country in and about Forbes Field where it was unsafe for pennant folk to go about their business.

Playing their first game under the management of Jewel E. Egan, successor to Donnie Bush, the Pirates lapped Perce Malone for fourteen hits and ten runs in seven innings to win by 10 to 3. Kiki Cuyler's homer had given the Cubs a 3 to 1 lead over Burleigh Grimes in the third. Nine of the runs were earned.

The Cubs dashed into a lead of 6 to 2 in the seventh round of the nightcap in Rogers Hornsby's thirtieth home run, and order seemed to be restored. In the home half, however, the Pirates assaulted Ken Penner, the Hoosier pitcher, for three runs, and continued the bombardment in the eighth for two more to win by 7 to 6.

Connie Mack righted the fortunes of the Athletics once more, but he had to end upon Bob Grove to clinch a 9 to 7 decision over the Yankees at the stadium on the Harlem. Walberg and Quinn had been roughly used and Eddie Rengel had been removed for a pinch batsman after one good inning. Grove got nothing but the exercise as the game was won by a five-run rally in the seventh before he entered the box.

After several brilliant if losing games, Roy Sherid was hammered into a state of helplessness and three succeeding Yankee pitchers fared little better. Babe Ruth returned after a lay-off of part of one game, and hammered out his thirty-sixth home run, increasing his lead. Gehrig hit his twenty-eighth and Len Lary fourth. The victory gave the American league leaders an even division of the two engagements in New York, and restored their margin to thirteen games.

The Senators rallied at the end to defeat the Red Sox by 7 to 4 in the second and final game of the short series in Washington. Walter Johnson's men took both. The four remaining American league clubs were idle.

For the folks in Illinois are pennant crazy now that the Cubs at last seem to have correlated the National league flag. And the folks from Rockford will be at the world series to root for their townsmen, Harold Gust, to come through as the hero of the big games.

Six is a Row  
Carlson has been a great help to Joe McCarthy in the Cubs' successful quest this year. Although his wins do not rival those of Bush, Root and Malone, he is putting on a fast finish. His last six victories have been successive and he has been beaten only twice this summer.

Carlson has been playing professional ball since 1912, and this promises to be his first world series. Starting out for Rockford in the old

W-I league, he was picked off by the Milwaukee American association club in 1914. In 1917 he came up to the majors with the Pittsburgh Pirates, where he stuck for seven years.

Pirates Shipped Him  
At Pittsburgh, he continually gave promise of becoming a star pitcher. But somehow he never came any further than the promise, for the Pirates finally gave him up as a bad job and shipped him back to the Texas league.

Here he untracked himself, winning 20 games and losing 10. The desperate Phillies took a gamble and brought him back in 1924. Carlson starred ever since.

In 1927 the Cubs, in rebuilding for a pennant, sent Tony Kaufmann and Jimmy Cooney to the Phils for the slim right-hander.
