Henry Nurze and Ross brothers of Eugene have been cited to appear to face the charges.

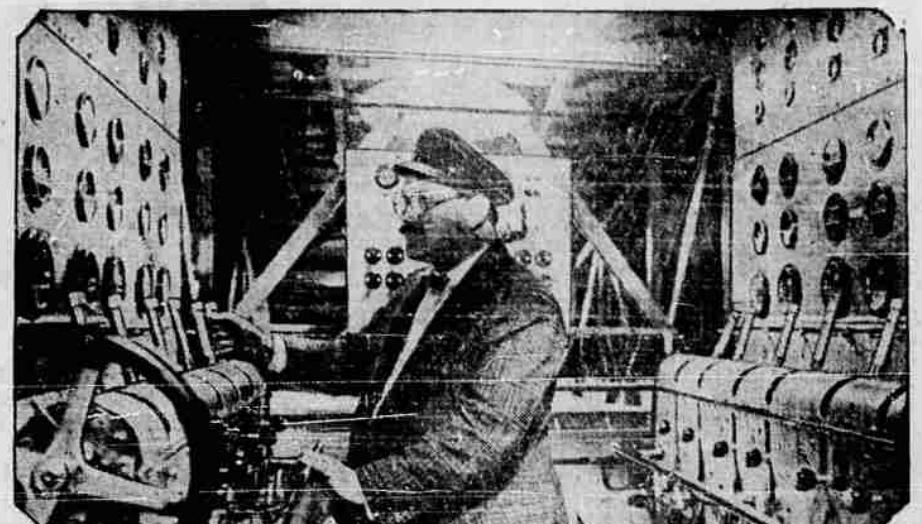

\$1214 GIVEN HERE FOR INFIRMARY ON UNIVERSITY CAMPUS

A total of \$1214 was subscribed in Eugene Thursday for the new infirmary at the University of Oregon when a number of co-eds from the Women's league on the campus sold more than 1200 "crackers" for the building. Mrs. Wilson H. Jewett, assisted by Mrs. Claude D. Rorer, had general charge in Eugene.

The figures compiled by Mrs. Jewett show the total for tags sold was \$952.50 while the total raised from the mothers of university students here was \$261.50.

The "dollar a brick" drive has been conducted in all communities of the state as result of the University of Oregon Mothers' club agreeing to raise \$400 to match an appropriation of \$50,000 from the state legislature for the building of the infirmary.

taken to life boats to do rescue work instead of to abandon the oil tanker, as was originally thought. The Dodd is a vessel of about 7000 tons.

Captain Asplund, who was reported in radio messages to have gone down with the San Juan, was acting master of the stricken ship during a leave of absence granted to its regular master, Captain George Whitt, it was learned from the marine department of the chamber of commerce.

Ralph Hillman, second radio operator of the San Juan, who was picked up by the Dodd, reported that the collision occurred while he was asleep. He sprang from his berth and ran to the main deck. The dock was sinking beneath the surface and he was hurled into the sea.

No Life Boats Out
Hillman said no life boats had been launched from the San Juan. Two coast guard cutters, the Shawnee and the Tahoe, went to the scene of the wreck. The Dodd, Francisco, while preparations got under way here to receive the injured from the tanker. Ambulances were sent to the pier at which the Dodd was expected to dock at 8 a. m.

Answering a query by the Examiner, the Dodd advised that it would reach San Francisco at 9:30 a. m. Every available ambulance in San Francisco was sent to the waterfront to receive the 27 persons picked up by the Dodd. Emergency hospitals were made ready to receive the survivors, some of whom were injured and reported badly in need of medical attention.

The San Juan, a double decker of iron construction, 235 feet long and of 3,000 gross tons, had sailed the seas for 47 years. She was one of the oldest ships on the Pacific, having first taken to the water shortly after the disappearance of the swift packets that carried the frontiers of trade to the Pacific coast.

ABOARD MUNAMI, OFF PIGEON POINT, CAL., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Ten survivors of the passenger steamer San Juan were aboard this rescue ship today following a night of desperate effort to save the lives of those who were cast into the ocean after its collision with the S. C. T. Dodd shortly before midnight.

The distress signal following the collision between the vessels was heard by our radio operator at 11:55 p. m., said the captain, Gus Illig.

We were just three miles astern of the San Juan in response to the signals we proceeded with all possible speed to the scene of the collision.

As the Munami pierced through the fog to the scene we found the San Juan sinking. We drifted in wreckage of the steamer for two hours. The wreckage was so thick it was difficult to pull a life boat through it.

"Oil from the lost ship, which coated the water, also added to rescue difficulties," said Illig.

"Life boats of the Munami were in the water at 12:30 a. m. and darted around as best they could in response to cries of passengers and crew struggling in the water and wreckage."

More than 2,500 new oil wells were drilled in Texas the first six months of this year.

FOX WILL OPERATE M'DONALD AND REX

Verification of the sale of the McDonald and Rex theaters of Eugene by Universal to Fox West Coast theaters was received by the Eugene Guard Friday in a telegram from Harold R. Franklin, president of the Fox chain.

He says, in the message, that the theaters in Eugene, Salem, Medford and Corvallis will be operated out of the Seattle Division under the direction of Earl L. Crabb, division manager.

No word has been received by Russell Brown, manager of the McDonald and Rex theaters here, concerning any change that may be made in the policies.

MANY INJURED IN BUILDING COLLAPSE

ALBUQUERQUE, Aug. 30.—(AP)—An unknown number of persons were buried early today in the crash of an old building on the waterfront, some estimates placing the number of victims between 50 and 70.

The building sheltered about 20 families. It suddenly crumbled and the inhabitants, most of whom still in their beds, were caught in the ruins. There were 18 children in the structure.

Two hours after the collapse five persons had been taken out of the ruins. Ten bodies and 18 injured persons were taken out of the ruins as the work of rescue continued through the morning. No complete check of casualties could be made.

Failure to Get Permit Charged

A warrant for the arrest of Blair Alderman, local contractor, charged with erecting a building without obtaining a building permit, was issued by City Recorder R. S. Ryerson Friday. The warrant was issued on the complaint of Building Inspector R. W. Rundlett, specifying that Alderman failed to obtain a permit for work done in June on a building on Olive street between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

The trial of J. E. Kilborn, charged with doing plumbing work at 1450 East Twenty-first avenue without a permit, has been set for September 3 in the municipal court.

Construction of Fish Trap Stayed

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—A temporary injunction enjoining John O. Baker, Portland, from constructing a fish trap in the Columbia river from the north shore to Tenasillahe island was issued in circuit court yesterday.

The order also restrained the Oregon fish commission an Warden M. T. Hoy from issuing any fish trap licenses in this section.

The injunction was signed following the filing of a complaint by Thomas Thompson an dive other Columbia river fishermen, who complained that the fish trap license had been issued to Baker by the fish commission in violation of Oregon laws.
