

COMMENCEMENT OF SUMMER STUDENTS HELD AT UNIVERSITY

The first summer school commencement of the University of Oregon was held Friday at which master's degrees were granted to 21, and students to 75, at the close of the most successful summer session in the twenty-five years it has been conducted by the University.

Dr. J. T. Speth, professor of English at Princeton University, and a member of the faculty on the cruise, delivered the commencement address on "Books and Experience," at 11 o'clock in the music auditorium.

Formerly commencement exercises were held at the University of Oregon building, but this year the ceremony was held at the new plan of the University.

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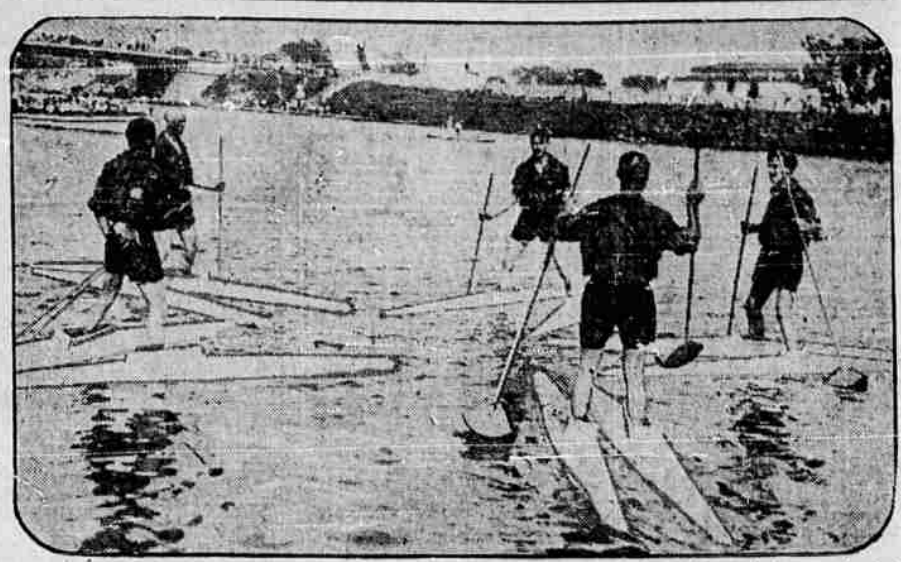

Scouts Honored By Kentuckians

HENDERSON, Ky., Aug. 29.—Daniel Boone and Col. Richard Henderson, striking figures in the early colonial history, are to be commemorated here October 11 and 12, as the founders of this Ohio river city, and the first successful settlers of Kentucky.

Commemorative exercises will center about the unveiling of six bronze tablets depicting the history of the Transylvania company, organized by Colonel Henderson in North Carolina, and disbanded only after the state of Virginia embraced its Kentucky holdings.
