The conductor can yell "all aboard" any time now for the Salt Creek Falls excursion Labor day, for everything is ready for the outing near the summit of the Cascades. The call will actually be made Monday morning at 8 o'clock, and the excursion train will be on its way.

L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific, looked up at the sky Saturday afternoon and predicted that the woods would be great after the little shower Saturday morning.
