However, John's attitude is more sensible than that of his neighbor Jim.

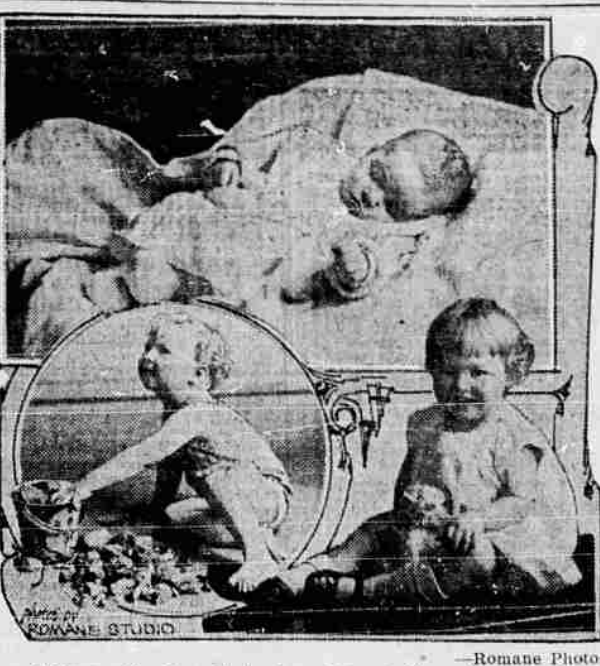

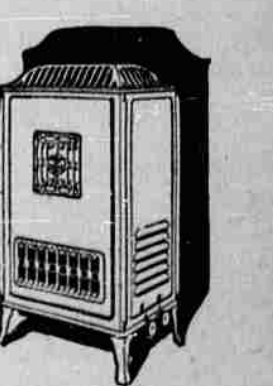
