

PUPILS OF 28 LANE SCHOOLS TO START LONG GRIND MONDAY

School children in 28 districts in Lane county were delving into closets and attics for books Saturday preparing to start the school year Monday.

Ten schools of the county have already started, opening the doors to the pupils on September 2 and 3.

The main body of school bells will ring September 10, while a few will remain quiet until the 23rd or 30th.

Schools starting Monday, September 9 as announced by E. J. Moore, county superintendent are those at Santa Clara, Spencer Creek, Latham, Mapleton, Cottage Grove, Silk Creek, Black Butte, Upper Camas, Swale, Fall Creek, McKenzie Bridge, Lowell, Finner, Starr, Elsie River, Mountain View, Unity, Vida, Malahon, Knoll, Upper Mabel, Dorcas, Richmond, Herriman, Westfir, Noroton, Pavy, Camas Swale, College Creek and Berrydale.

On Labor day the schools at Mabel, Spencer Butte, Minerva, Beers and Ada were started. On September 9 those at Portage, Noll, Glenda and Big Creek opened. The Alma school started on the 4th.

The Franklin school year will start September 23, while Fisher, Eula and Trent have announced September 30 as their opening dates.

Forrest Findley, who visited at Mr. Moore's office Friday afternoon said that the school at Wendling, which opening date had been set for September 9, would not open until the 23rd or 30th. The new school building, while completed, must have some work on the interior done before it can be opened to pupils.

All other schools in the county will start September 10.

WHEREABOUTS OF SWINDLER MYSTERY

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 7.—(Special)—Although still confused by a maze of information regarding the possible whereabouts and financial transactions of C. D. Waggoner, president of the Bank of Telluride, Telluride, Colo., authorities today held the theory he took desperate measures to save his financial position in the bank from financial loss.

Waggoner is being sought in connection with manipulations which placed \$500,000 belonging to a Denver bank to his credit in a New York banking institution.

The officers based their theory on a telegram to C. W. Dowd, cashier of the Bank of Telluride, which the bank president's wife said she sent for him yesterday from Wray, Colo.

"I had this money sent you for the depositors. See that they get it before somebody starts something and do it confidentially. You have enough for everybody."

Dowd said he did not receive the money referred to in the telegram.

A Eugene-made book, "Education and the State," printed by senior students in the class in typography at the University of Oregon, is one of 27 books selected for the American division of the international exhibition recently held in the king's library of the British museum.

Word of the honor has been received by Eric W. Allen, dean of the university school of journalism. The exhibition was prepared for the international typographic conference held recently in London.

The catalogue describes the Oregon book as "Education and the State, Prince L. Campbell's Philosophy of Public Education printed as a memorial by members of the last class that remembers him as a teacher. With an introduction note by Arnold Bennett Hall, The University of Oregon Fine Arts Press, Eugene, 1927. Composed by senior students of the class in typography at the University of Oregon. Printed for private distribution only, in Jensen-style Roman."
