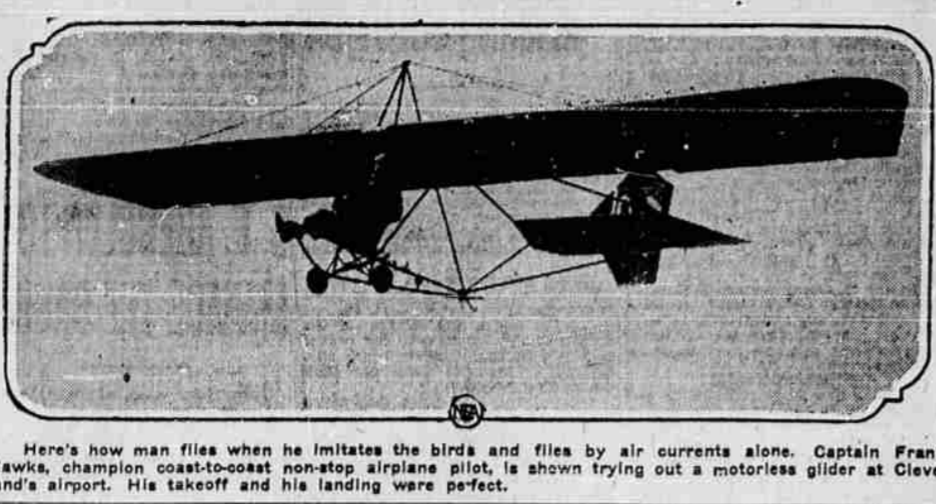

### DEFENSE WITNESS FOR MRS. PANTAGES CONTRADICTS STATE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Defense guns were trained today on damaging evidence which the state, during six days and a half of testimony, had marshalled against Mrs. Lois Pantages, on trial in superior court charged with murder in the second degree.

The state has contended that the wife of Alexander Pantages, the Japanese, was intoxicated when her automobile collided with a car driven by Juro Hokumoto last June. Hokumoto, several days after the accident, died. The defense, when it took over the case yesterday, already had indicated that its chief point would be that an intervening operation might have caused the death of the Japanese. Physicians, appearing as state witnesses, have testified under cross examination that the operation performed upon Hokumoto was not an emergency case.

Testimony Contested  
Max Steuer of New York, and W. L. Gilbert and Joseph Ford of Los Angeles, defense counsel, placed their first four major witnesses on the stand yesterday to contest the state charges. State witnesses uniformly had testified they believed Mrs. Pantages to have been intoxicated at the time of the crash.

Mrs. Bertha Jacobs, called for the defense, told the jury that to the best of her knowledge the theater manager was sober 15 minutes before the crash. She had spent the week-end of June 16 at the Pantages home in Venice, a beach suburb, had ridden into Los Angeles with Mrs. Pantages, and left the car 15 minutes before the accident.

Car Forced to Curb  
John Costerno, operator of a service station on Serrano avenue and Sunset boulevard, the scene of the crash, departed wholly from previous given testimony, and related that Mrs. Pantages' automobile was forced to the left side of the street by a big touring car. States testimony consistently had been that no cars except those of Mrs. Pantages and Rokumoto were near the scene of the accident.

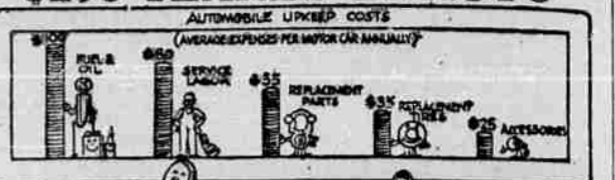

### AVERAGE OWNER SPENDS \$295 YEARLY ON AUTO

THE "gas station" has come to be a familiar part of the American roadside landscape and an important convenience in modern life. However, probably few people realize that it constitutes a large portion of a trade which amounts to more than \$7,000,000,000 annually.

This is the sum of the operating expenses of the country's 25,000,000 motor cars. According to estimates reported by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, \$140 is spent for fuel and lubricants by the average motorist every year; \$55 for replacement parts and supplies; \$35 for tire replacements; \$25 for accessories, and \$30 for service labor.

The total average expense for upkeep for each car is \$295, and the aggregate is \$7,230,000,000. Two decades ago the average American family spent practically nothing on automobiles. Now such expenses constitute one of the important items of the family budget, as much to be provided for as food, rent or clothing.

Of the money spent to run an automobile it is interesting to note that the gas station gets the largest portion, or \$2,484,000,000 against \$1,360,000,000 for replacement parts; \$839,000,000 for tire replacement; \$507,000,000 for accessories; and \$2,040,000,000 for service labor. The roadside gas station had its inception about 1912, in California.

### WAGGONER CLAIMED HELPED BY WOMAN

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 13.—(AP)—E. D. Averill, special operative of a Denver investigation service, said today that Miss Frances Carlson, 18, stenographer in the bank of Telluride, told him "unwillingly" she sent from Denver two of the six faked telegrams by which C. D. Waggoner is charged with having attempted to defraud 6 New York banks of \$500,000.

Miss Carlson has been subpoenaed by a federal grand jury in New York as a witness in the case. Averill arrived here yesterday with Clarence E. Downton, cashier of the bank of Telluride, whom he is taking to New York. Downton also has been subpoenaed.

The young woman told the detective she had sent the telegrams from Denver at the request of a woman whom she did not know and who told her it was a bit of work to be done for Waggoner.

World is Humdrum With No Noise, Said  
BLOOMINGTON, Ill.—(AP)—While some scientists are making sound tests and depicting the harm noise does, Prof. F. C. Dockery, psychologist at Illinois Wesleyan here, is inclined to dissent.

"This would be a humdrum world if we could eliminate all noises," says Professor Dockery. "Noises which interfere with speech, disturb the ill and those 'pet' noises which irritate, are really harmful. Noises which people believe harmful are usually associated with disagreeable situations."

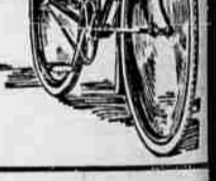
