

Hollywood Leads Coast League By One And A Half Game Margin

MISSIONS SHARE SECOND RUNG WITH SOUTHERN ANGELS

The Hollywood Stars had the Pacific Coast league lead sewed up today with a margin of one and a half games, after trouncing the San Francisco Mission Reds for the second time in two days in Los Angeles.

Meanwhile, the Reds were sinking lower and lower. Only the day before yesterday they occupied the top notch position, but Hollywood gave them a setback, and today the Missions were tied for second place with the Los Angeles Angels.

The Stars defeated the Reds by an 11 to 4 score, behind the pitching of John. Although touched for eleven hits, the Hollywood pitcher was strong in the pinches, and held the heavy hitting San Franciscans to one run until the closing inning. Home runs by Huff and Hoffman brought the Mission rallies.

Los Angeles downed the Seals 11 to 8, taking a two-to-one edge on the series. Vernon Gomez, young left-hander sold recently to the New York Yankees, started the game but was batted out of the box in the third when the Angels scored eight runs. Val Giron relieved Gomez and after getting out of the trouble, held the home team at Recreation Park to a shutout until the eighth inning when the Angels put across three unearned runs to gain the winning margin.

The Oakland A's took the merbles at Emeryville yesterday, defeating the Portland Ducks in an up-bill contest 9 to 8. Just as they did the day before, the Ducks let the winning punch go when Charlie Bates popped out and Larry Wood, all-arounder found willing hands after they had the winning run on base in the ninth inning with only one out. The Oaks had the Ducks on the short of the end of an 8 to 2 score at the close of the sixth.

A freak blow by Horace Ford for four bases with one led on the path to enabled the veteran Elmer Rixey to shade Dazzy Vance and the Robins at Cincinnati by 3 to 2 in the second game of the series. The ball chased Babe Herman into the right field seats, and itself skipped merrily about outside for a home run as Herman tried to extricate himself from his predicament.

Rain in St. Louis built up a double-header today for the Braves and the Cardinals.

Warner's Defense Stops Army Passes

"How much work do you give your team on defense?" I asked Jimmy Dellart, a Warner pupil at Pitt, when Jimmy was concealing a fine Washington and Lee eleven. "About half an hour a week," he snapped back. Defensive play is not of the value it used to be. Coaches have to stress attack or they are out of luck. They depend chiefly in fight when they are sure a pass is coming. But Pop Warner gets nine. Pop drops back five middle men of his line when a pass is pulled. Nine men cover the five. They spread into the backfield fan fashion. Only the ends rush the passer. My how they do it!

Just look at the down field territory in the accompanying sketch. Arrows show the five eligible men covered? Launching a successful aerial attack versus such a lay out is impossible. Pop goes most of them one better. Opponent's passes are often boomerangs. Warner's men run them back for touchdown, as the Army learned last year. Tomorrow we'll see how this defense quickly breaks into offense.

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GREAT BATTLES TO FEATURE OPENING OF BOXING SEASON

Where—Eugene armory.

When—Friday.

Main event—Willard Norton, Eugene, vs. Bob Jubb, Albina, both welterweights, 10 rounds.

Semi-windup—Tony O'Dell, 145, Leaburg, vs. Richard Van Schoik, 148, Camas, Wash., six rounds.

Specials—Three four-round specials.

With Willard Norton, Eugene Bulldog, and Bob Jubb, Albina mauler, in the 10-round headline event, the fall and winter season of boxing in Eugene will be inaugurated at the armory Friday evening. The card is expected to draw one of the biggest opening houses ever assembled in Eugene.

Twenty-eight rounds of boxing are billed on the program.

Arrangements for a capacity house are being made by Herb Owen, matchmaker for the local boxing commission.

"Leaburg will be down in a body to watch Tony O'Dell. Babe McVay will bring them in from the Triangle lake area, local boys on the card will pack in the Eugeneans, and the prospects of a slugger card will be a drawing power for the rest of the fans. With the deer season closed, prospective deer hunters need not lack for diversion until the season is opened again," is the way Owen sizes up the situation.

Norton and Jubb both are hard hitters and ready mixers, and the main event is expected to be one of the strongest local attractions on the books. The semi-windup between Tony O'Dell and Richard Van Schoik of Camas, Wash., is expected to be another hard hitting event. O'Dell was originally billed with Austin Rosander of Ashland, but Rosander is fighting forest fires and will be unable to come in for the fracas. Van Schoik's record shows him to be a better scrapper than Rosander, so the number will add flavor.

O'Dell needs no introduction here. In his five hot fights on local cards he won three and gained two draws. He has a habit of stealing the show in his fights.

The four-round special between Babe McVay, 152 pounder from the Triangle lake area, and Jack Wallace of Albany will be another battle royal. Both fighters are trying to break into bigger stuff. McVay, who is a sawyer, is a slugger of strong staying power. Wallace recently returned from China. The other four round special will where he worked his way on a freighter.

match Battling Judd, 140, of Roseburg, and Al Straub, 130, of Portland. Straub is a coming youngster, who has fought but seven or eight fights in Portland, but whose record shows up well. Judd fought Jimmy Lee, well known to local fans, in one of the last scraps Roseburg ever witnessed. He has knocked out Joe Blackwell and Terry Kileen of Eugene, Buzzsaw Burnell of Portland and Red Raider of Yakima, all well known here.

Norton has fought 25 battles under Herb Owen in the past year, and has lost but three. His record shows six knockouts to his credit, and he never has taken even a short count himself. His record shows that in his 25 fights he never has had a "set-up," but has fought the best welter in the northwest has had to offer.

Both headline boys are youngsters. Jubb is 23 years of age, while Norton isn't old enough to vote yet.

GERMAN ADVANCE ON CROWN HALTED

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The German advance on the heavyweight championship vacated by America's Gene Tunney, seems to have come to a dead halt.

Max Schmeling, the Hamburg aspirant to the throne, fought his way into contending position and then was rendered hors de combat by edict of the New York State Athletic Commission.
