

# MISSING WITNESS SOUGHT BY POLICE

TUCSON, Ariz., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Federal authorities, Tucson police, and Pima county sheriff's deputies today were searching the desert north of here for Miss Bundy, missing witness in a Mann act violation case. Her presence was discovered when an automobile was subsequently identified as the property of E. Rowell of Kansas City, was found abandoned nine miles from here, near Hialeah road. Investigators could find no tracks indicating how or in what direction she had left the car.

A note pinned to the steering wheel of the machine instructed finders to notify Rowell, the writer indicating that it was Mrs. Rowell who had left the car. Telegraphic queries directed to Rowell in Kansas City, however, brought the explanation from him that the car, although his, had been loaned to Mrs. Bundy, who had been absent for her health.

Also in the front seat of the machine, investigators found a woman's purse, an empty pistol holster, a pair of glasses, a pencil, and a pair of slippers. Preliminary search revealed no trace of the woman.

Several men are busy re-roofing the O. A. company packing building, getting ready for the fall fruit packing season.

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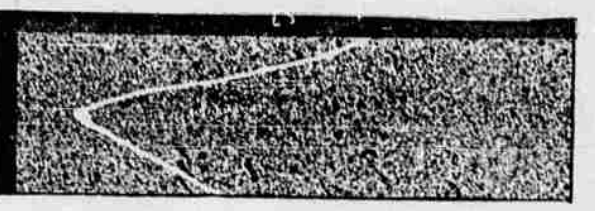
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
