

FRESHMEN EXAMS AT UNIVERSITY TO START SATURDAY

Students from Eugene and nearby towns who are entering the University of Oregon this year, will have the advantage of taking their physical examinations early and leaving the regular freshman week more open. For these students the examination will be given Saturday from 8 to 4:30 in the Gerlinger building and men's gymnasium. Any students who are assigned other dates and are in Eugene on Saturday can change appointments to this date by calling the registrar's office.

The official freshman week begins promptly at 8 o'clock Monday, Sept. 23, with an assembly for all freshmen at which Hugh Biggs, acting dean of men, and several students will address the incoming freshmen. Mr. Biggs' subject will be "Student Life." On Tuesday and Wednesday at 8 Mr. Platt will instruct freshmen on registration procedure. Half of the freshmen will attend each assembly.

Physical, English and psychology examinations, as well as library instruction are by specific appointment, and freshmen have already been notified of their appointment dates.

Registration material will not be realized until signatures showing that all lectures and examinations have been attended are procured. Registration material will be released Thursday morning, Sept. 26, at 8 o'clock at Johnson hall. The student secures this material and takes it to his advisor who will help him make out his program for the year. When this is completed, he takes it to McArthur court to procure signatures of the dean of women or men, and to pay fees.

McArthur court will remain open until Saturday noon, Sept. 28. If students are not registered by this time they will have to wait until Monday.

The course "How to understand and enjoy good music," is composed of a series of lectures by members of the school of music faculty and is intended to bring out the interesting facts about musical instruments, the structure, history and general meaning of music. Those who will lecture are Dean John J. Landsbury, George Hopkins, Arthur Bowman, John Stark Evans, Rex Underwood, Mrs. Anne Landsbury Beck, Madame Rose McGrew and Mrs. Jane Thacher. The class will be held in the music building from 7:15 to 9:15 on Wednesday.

A sixth course will be given in education on "New Methods in classroom examinations," by Nelson L. Boush of the school of education on every Wednesday at 7:15. It will carry two hours of credit and will be a study of the principles of test building, practice in the building of such tests and the procedure in remedial teaching.

Two courses will be given from 7:15 to 9:15 on Thursday. "Practical Public Speaking," a course adapted to the peculiar needs of the business and "professional man and woman" will be taught by Ralph Bowler, new professor in English and debate coach.

Fundamental principles of speech structure and oral composition will be treated with maximum care. It will be held in 110 Johnson hall.

Prof. Ernest G. Mott of the English department, will teach "Types of Literature." It will consist of a study of the novel, drama, poetry and other types of literature, with the aim of developing an understanding of the history and technical characteristics of the various types, for the purpose of laying the basis of an understanding of modern literature, and why and how it has come to be. Recent writers will be interpreted in the light of their literary inheritance. The class will be held in room 4, Johnson hall.

SPORTSMEN FORM FISH, GAME CLUB ON SILTCOOS LAKE

The organization of the Roosevelt Club, Inc., an exclusive hunting and fishing club of Oregon sportsmen, located at Westlake on the western shore of Siltcoos lake in western Lane county, was announced here Friday by H. A. Drake, president and manager. Articles of incorporation were filed here late Thursday.

The former Westlake hotel property has been acquired by the club and is undergoing complete refitting and extensive remodeling. Docks will be constructed on the lake front to accommodate the fleet of boats and launches which will be maintained for the convenience of the club members. The alterations are expected to be completed in time to open the club on Armistice day, according to Mr. Drake. Accommodations for 60 are being provided. W. F. Higgins, Portland architect, is supervising the work.

E. C. Simmons of Eugene has been made a member of the club's board of governors. Other members of the governing board are Dr. Ben M. Wade, chairman, L. V. Jenkins, Portland's chief of police, Ward W. Wells, Raymond A. Chapin, Will R. Lewis, J. V. Hartley and Loy Lefingwell, all of Portland. Officers of the club are H. A. Drake, president and manager; Raymond A. Chapin, vice-president; and L. M. Drake, secretary-treasurer. The club is starting with a membership of 100, which is to be increased to 200. A number of Eugene sportsmen will be asked to join the group, membership in which is by invitation only, said Mr. Drake. Among some of the well-known Oregon sportsmen listed among the members are Governor Isaac L. Patterson; Mark D. McAllister, state corporation commissioner; Ben Hur Lampman, editorial writer for the Oregonian; Guy W. Talbot and F. F. Pitcock of Portland.

Siltcoos lake, said Mr. Drake, is the finest duck lake in the entire country, and is ideally located to become one of the most famous resorts in the United States. Its many bays are favorite stopping places for ducks and geese and the lake itself offers endless possibilities for fishing and boating. Ninety miles of shoreline are surrounded with forests filled with game animals, making the location a "sportsman's paradise."

The Roosevelt club can now be reached with the opening of the silver road along the North Fork, ferrying at Florence to Glenada and then driving on to Westlake. The Roosevelt highway, when completed, will pass through Westlake near the club property.

School Has First Assembly Program

The first assembly of the year was held by the Roosevelt Junior high school on Wednesday afternoon.

A musical program was followed by a talk given by Harley Nottor, principal, who gave an explanation of building rules.

The student body president, Richard Johnson, was introduced and gave a talk explaining the school government.

A new system, known as the "home room system" was put into effect at the school. Under this program each student is assigned to a home room under a guidance teacher. This guidance teacher advises on questions and problems that come up, on work, studies, and has personal conferences with the student. The system is a modified form of the one used in the larger eastern and California schools. Principal Nottor studied the work at Stanford under Professor Professor Redding of Harvard university.
