LOUIS E. BEAN PRINCIPAL SPEAKER AT FORUM LUNCH

CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR IS GUEST OF BEND CLUB

Mr. Bean Gives Eloquent and Stirring Address on Needs of Central Oregon

BEND, Ore., May 3.—(Special to the Register)—Louis E. Bean, republican candidate for governor of Oregon at the May primaries, was the principal speaker at the forum luncheon of the Bend Commercial club on Wednesday noon at the Hotel Butte Inn.

He is the first person, so far as is known, to drive from Klamath Falls to Bend this year and his declaration in his speech showed that central Oregon needs highway.

FARMERS OF MID-WEST HARD HIT THIS SEASON

RAIN AND COOL WEATHER HINDER SPRING PLANTING

Winter Grain and Grass Have Made Satisfactory Progress, Says Weekly Crop Review

WASHINGTON, May 3.—It's just one thing after another for the farmers in the middle west, it was indicated by reports summarized today by the weather bureau in its weekly weather and crop review.

Winter grain and grass in the central states, however, made satisfactory progress, the review stated, adding that beneficial rains fell in northern Florida and portions of the southwest where droughty conditions have prevailed.

Planting of corn was reported as well along in central and southern Kansas but the work was much delayed in central valley states.
