### STATE HOTEL MEN TO BE ENTERTAINED TWO DAYS

Annual Convention to Be Held Here Saturday and Sunday

Seventy-Five Delegates Expected Here for Business and Pleasure Sessions

The program of the Oregon Hotelmen's convention to be held here May 6 and 7 includes a trip to Cottage Grove and Calapooia springs, a visit to the campus of the university and a banquet at the Hotel Osburn. Complete details of the two days' session have not yet been arranged, the speakers having not been secured as yet.

Delegates to the convention from the Willamette valley below Eugene and from eastern Oregon will arrive here in automobiles at 2:30 o'clock, May 6, according to the plans. The party will leave the Imperial hotel in Portland at 8 o'clock in the morning, have lunch at the Hotel Albany in Albany at noon, and will visit the campus of the University of Oregon upon their arrival here. After the visit to the campus the business session of the convention will be held at the chamber of commerce with a banquet at the Hotel Osburn at 6:30 o'clock.

The program for Sunday, May 7, will begin at 8:45 when an automobile party leaves the Hotel Osburn for Cottage Grove, arriving at the Bartlett hotel in that town at 10:30. The party will leave the hotel at 10:45 for Calapooia springs near London, Oregon, where a picnic luncheon will be served upon their arrival there at 12:30. The party will return to Eugene Sunday afternoon and several speeches will probably be arranged for that day.

Delegates to the convention from southern Oregon points and other members not included in the automobile party leaving Portland Friday morning will arrive here by train and automobile. An attendance of about 75 is expected here for the two day conference.

Phil Meschan, of the Imperial hotel in Portland, is president of the Oregon Hotel Men's association and will be here for the convention. The entertainment and program details are being handled by a committee of local hotel men composed of Harold J. Glasou, of the Hotel Osburn, and John A. McLean, of the Griggs hotel. The details for the entertainment at Cottage Grove are in charge of C. A. Bartlett of the Bartlett hotel at that place.

### LODGE BUYS SCHOOL LOT

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS OBTAIN SITE FOR NEW HOME

Old Central School Will Be Razed and Modern Building Erected Some Time

The Central school property at the corner of Eleventh avenue west and Olive street as predicted by the Morning Register a short time ago has been purchased by the local lodge of Knights of Pythias. The deal was completed yesterday, according to members of the committee when the abstract to the property was approved by attorneys. The purchase price was \$8,000.

The old school building will be torn down at some future time, say members of the committee and plans will be made to erect a modern lodge building but not for a number of years, it is said. The property was obtained at what the members of the committee deemed a very reasonable price. The lot has a frontage of 176 feet on Olive street and 167 feet on Eleventh avenue. It was built about 50 years ago by the Eugene school district, W. T. Campbell, of this city, being the contractor. At that time Eugene had a very small population and the building housed all the school pupils in the city for many years. It was built in the east end of the half block on which it and the city hall now stand and was moved to one side to make room for the high school building erected in 1902, now used as a city hall.

The action of the committee in selecting this site for a lodge home was taken after a large number of other sites were examined and after a great deal of deliberation. The committee decided upon this site some time ago but for some reason did not choose to make its selection known to the public until yesterday.

### OLIVE STREET GARAGE SOLD

R. J. HAWLEY TAKES OVER EASTER AND MITCHELL BUSINESS

Agency for Gardner Car to Be Handled by New Proprietor and Old Force Retained

A deal was completed yesterday whereby R. J. Hawley, of this city purchased the Easter and Mitchell garage on Olive street between Ninth and Tenth avenues west. Mr. Hawley has taken charge of the place and the same force of mechanics will be retained and that the garage will be conducted along the same lines as before.

Carl Easter and Henry Mitchell, members of the old firm, who have been in the garage business here for a number of years, have operated this one for more than a year. They said yesterday that they have no definite plans for the future but intend to stay in Eugene. They express appreciation of the business which they have enjoyed while operating this garage and bespeak for Mr. Hawley a continuation of the trade which they have built up.

Mr. Hawley will continue to handle the Gardner car. This is a comparatively new make, having been on the market but four or five years, and no agency has been conducted here previous to the time Easter and Mitchell took it.

Mr. Hawley is former proprietor of the Monarch cafeteria in this city.

### BUNDLE DAY IS DESIGNATED

MAY 24 DATE OF COLLECTION FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF

Clothing Wanted for Armenians Many of Whom Are Totally Destitute

May 24 will be bundle day for near east relief throughout the United States. Last year America sent 1,000 tons of clothing to the near east. President Maesnanagian of the Armenian republic, says that one-fifth of the present population of that section have been clothesless during the year. New clothing wears out fast enough, the supply of half-worn garments is now completely exhausted. Numberless men, women and children are destitute of clothing and thousands have no covering whatever save the thinnest rags, it is reported.

Inside the near east relief orphanages, much of the clothing is manufactured by the children themselves under the direction of the relief workers, but it is stated the majority of them and almost the entire population of Armenia will have to dress in American second hand clothes again next year.

Approximately eighty per cent of the hand looms have been destroyed during the war, famine and invasion have scattered the women and girls who formerly operated them and the flocks of sheep which in former days furnished the wool have been killed for food or stolen by invaders.

"With the exception of food there is no greater need than that of clothing," says J. J. Handwerker, state director of near east relief, who traveled extensively in the near east last summer. "Therefore I am asking the people of Oregon to respond to the appeal for warm clothing and shoes that comes to us from the near east and southern Russia."

It is planned that the appeal for spare clothing be spread in schools, churches, clubs and lodges through speakers, illustrated circulars, motion pictures and the press, that every organized group in the state may have opportunity to make collection of clothes, and that it also be presented to clothing concerns whose shelves and store rooms may be cleared of shop worn garments that are too poor or out of date to sell and too good to throw away.

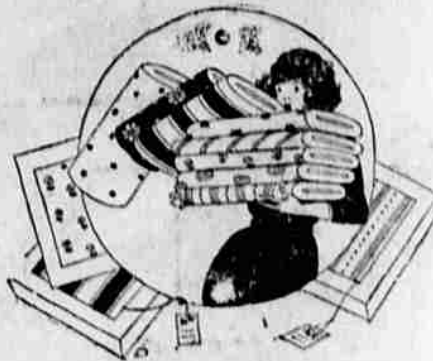
