#### PROFESSIONALS TO PERFORM FOR SHRINE CLUB

University of Oregon and Agricultural College Tumbler Will Be on the Program

More professional acts are being booked daily by the committee of the Eugene Shrine club in charge of the big indoor circus to be given May 10 and 11 at the armory. The entire program, as completed to date, comprises enough entertainment to last throughout the evening in both the two large rings and the stage. The acts consist of aerial acts, a large animal show which will present several features, slack wire artists, tumblers, sword men, clowns, and in fact every feature that is seen in an outdoor circus. Some of the acts are being brought to Eugene at great expense on the part of the Shrine club; the reason being that they were obtained because the acts had previously been booked to play in Portland the week following the local show and were not averse to playing an engagement here.

Eugene people are thus being given an opportunity to see a circus which will be featured a week later in Portland before Portland acts it.

In spite of the show itself, which is almost entirely professional, the management will be in the hands of local citizens. ### Auto Registration to Reach 124,500

SALEM, Ore., May 4.—In a statement issued today, Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, estimates that the automobile registration in Oregon for this year will reach 124,500 as against 118,615 for 1921. On April 30 the registration had reached 100,027, an increase of five per cent over the first four months of last year. Motor vehicle registrations have declined about 9.25 per cent and chauffeur registrations have more than trebled.
