

FIRST DAY OF COUNTY FAIR TO BE EUGENE DAY

Opening Attendance Expected to Be Boosted

NO "COMPS" TO BE ISSUED

Campaign of Publicity in Favor of Measure to Buy Grounds Will Be Inaugurated

The first day of this year's Lane county fair, Tuesday, September 19, was yesterday designated by the board of directors at a special meeting as Eugene day. The first day has heretofore been marked by very poor attendance for the reason that it is generally thought that all exhibits are not in place and no horse races are held that day but the board this year plans to make it the biggest day of all and it is thought that the attendance on the other three days will be up to average. The receipts of the fair are expected to be boosted considerably under this plan.

No "Comps" to Be Issued

No complimentary tickets at all will be issued for the fair this year. It was decided at the meeting. It has

been customary to issue "comps" to the members of the board of directors and the officials as well as to many others but the directors agree to pay their way in this year and expect every body else to. The press, however, will be taken care of. It was announced. A committee on publicity consisting of A. R. Gray, N. E. Glass and W. A. Ayres was named. At this meeting the president and secretary were authorized to close the contract for James McClellan's horse show to be staged each night of the fair. This is said to be a big attraction.

Purchase of Grounds Sought

The matter of submitting the question of the purchase of the fair grounds by the county to the voters at the election May 19 was taken up in detail and a campaign of publicity was decided upon. A pamphlet setting forth the reasons why the grounds should be purchased will be printed and will be widely distributed and a lot of personal work will be carried on. The grounds consist of 65 acres which can be had for \$20,000 under an option which expires next fall. Improvements valued at \$20,000 have been placed upon the grounds since the fair was established.

It is simply a question of continuing or discontinuing the fair," said W. A. Ayres, secretary, yesterday.

INSPECT POWER PLANT

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS VISIT WALTERVILLE STATION

A number of members of the technical society of the university made a trip to Walterville, 17 miles from Eugene on the McKenzie river, yesterday, to visit the Eugene municipal power plant there. The members had a picnic lunch and inspected the plant and the site. The party left by motor about 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Walterville plant is unique, all the electric power used in Eugene except that used by the street car lines and the university. It uses about one-third of the normal available water power of the river or about 1200 cubic feet per second.

The idea of the picnic, according to Dr. E. A. Caswell, head of the pre-engineering department at the university, is to give students real contact with an engineering project and at the same time combine business with pleasure.

Carl A. McClain, superintendent of the city water works, who invited the society to visit the plant, gave an illustrated lecture.
