Prof. Hylop pointed out the average yield of potatoes in Oregon as approximately 2.5 of that of Maine, due in a large measure to diseases that can to a great extent be controlled by treatment and careful field selection of healthy plants.

By the aid of charts and results of the experience of the O. A. C. as well as individual growers scattered throughout the state, he presented a striking array of facts showing that correct cutting of seed stock and their selection determined the quality and the yield. At the close of his address Professor Hylop was kept busy answering questions, examined some of the local growers' seed stock and gave advice to those interested in possible certification the coming year.
