OREGON TAKEN INTO CAMP BY WASHINGTON, 18-7

**Loose Playing Marks First of
Two-Game Series**

The University of Washington nine
took the Oregon varsity into camp
18-7 on the Cemetery Ridge diamond
yesterday afternoon in a loose con-
test, the first of a two-game series.
The second will be played at four
o'clock this afternoon.

The northerners gathered seven-
teen hits to eight for the Lemon Yel-
low and in the last inning led a parade
across the home plate for nine tallies.
The Washington moundmen, Leonard
and Setzer, who went in in the fifth,
managed to keep the Oregon
hits well scattered except in the fifth
when the varsity connected with
Leonard for three runs. In the sixth,
the Huskies or Sun Dodgers, what-
ever they please these days, started
the steady climb that ended at 18-7.
Bakke, Washington third sacker,
was the big cog in a machine-like
infield. His throws to first and his
work with the stick were revelations.
In five times up he snared four
safeties.

Bill Soraby, varsity right fielder,
first man up in the second, started
the futile Oregon attack with a
homer. Walt of Washington, con-
nected with Dug Wright in the final
inning for a four base hit, scoring
the two men ahead of him.

LONDON, May 9.—The fight be-

WHEAT CROP SHOWS GAIN

**YIELD OF GRAIN FORECAST AT
284,793,000 BUSHELS**

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Improvement
was shown in the winter wheat
crop during the last month of the
department of agriculture today fore-
casting this year's production at 284-
793,000 bushels based on the May 1
condition.

Today's forecast is approximately
12,500,000 bushels more than was es-
timated a month ago, 2,500,000 bush-
els less than produced last year and
5,000,000 bushels larger than the
average production for the last five
years.

There was almost 10,000,000 bush-
els increase in the production fore-
cast for rye compared with a month
ago. A total crop of 79,152,000 bush-
els is forecast.

FARM CREDITS DISCUSSED

**SENATE BLOC AND FARM LEAD-
ERS HOLD CONFERENCE**

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Legisla-
tion to provide long term credits for
farmers was discussed at a conference
tonight between members of the un-
official senate agriculture bloc and
representatives of national farm or-

ganizations. The object of the con-
ference, according to Senator Capper,
Republican, Kansas, chairman of the
bloc, was to endeavor to unite those
interested in the legislation behind a
composite bill.

Senator Capper was authorized to
appoint a committee later to present
recommendations. The meeting was
the first of the bloc since Senator
Capper was chosen to succeed former
Senator Kenyon, of Iowa.

A half dozen long term agricultural
credit bills are before congress with
some of the provisions agreeable to
various elements in and out of con-
gress. Senator Capper said. There
are disagreements also on various
points which it is hoped to work out
later.

Duchet Asks Reduced Rates
SALEM, Ore., May 9.—Fred Duch-
et, member of the public service com-
mission, today opened negotiations
with the Southern Pacific company
for a reduction in the freight rate on
watermelons from the Portland depot
in Douglas county to Portland and
other terminals in the state. Under
present freight costs there is little
profit in melon raising.
