### DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE.  
PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—Notwithstanding the extreme values today in effect and the expectations of an early decline in values, the market for butter here shows storage operations. This is a condition wholly unexpected here and indicates either one of two things: the trade figures that the declines will be limited or else that the general expectation is for a really "flush" production and a generally short market.

CHICKEN PRICES SHOW A HALT  
Chicken prices are again showing a halt. While some business in heavy lots is shown as high as 25¢, the bulk is around 24¢ while light weight stock is ruling generally at 20¢ to 21¢ a pound. Spring ducks around 40¢ for a limited supply.

POTATO INACTIVITY IS SHOWING  
With increasing supplies due to weather conditions, market for country-killed calves is off about 1¢ a pound generally with the extreme top at 14¢ and some tops as low as 13½¢ a pound. Hogs steady.
