LANE WILL HAVE ONLY ONE SET OF ELECTION OFFICIALS

Ballots Will Not Be Counted During Daytime

RETURNS WILL BE SLOW

County Court in Failing to Provide for Second Board Thought Ballot Would Be Short

Only one set of officials will preside at the primary elections in the different precincts of Lane county, May 19, and on that account the returns will be slow in coming in as they have in the past.

A new state law provides for a second board of officials to begin counting the votes at 10 a. m. on election day, but no provision for this second board was made by the county court. It is long the belief that the ballot would be very short at this election and an additional board would not be necessary. The estimated cost of a second set of officials in the larger precincts is \$1,000.

Instead of a short ballot as expected, the Republican ballot as it now appears is almost as long as the ballot would be very short at sides there is a separate ballot for the county fair measure, one for the recall of the state public service commission, and in Eugene, one for the street widening paving and measures. In precincts like those of Eugene it is expected that it will require a greater part of the night to count all the ballots.

WOODCOCK STRUCK BY CAR

PIONEER ATTORNEY HURT IN STREET ACCIDENT

A. C. Woodcock, pioneer attorney, was severely but not seriously injured when struck by an automobile at the corner of Sixth avenue and Williams street early last evening.

One of the trucks of the Pacific Transfer company, driven by A. C. Farrington, was proceeding south on Williams street and a car was being driven west on Sixth avenue. The driver of the car drove in front of the truck, although the latter had a right-of-way, and just as he passed he seemed to become panic-stricken and swerved his machine over toward the curb opposite the Hampton block. Just then Mr. Woodcock stepped into the street and the car struck him. He was knocked down and bystanders say that he would have been run over had not the front wheel of the car struck the curb. Mr. Woodcock was stunned for a short time by the blow and he suffered a contusion on the head and an abrasion on one hand but he was able to go to dinner soon afterward. The name of the driver of the car was not learned. The license number was 73,159.

E. B. U. ORATOR IS WINNER

TED GOODWIN RECEIVES HONORS AT NEWBERG MEET

A Ted Goodwin, student of the Eugene Bible university, was awarded first place in the annual state collegiate peace oratorical contest held at Pacific college at Newberg. Five state institutions of higher learning were represented including Eugene Bible university, Pacific college, Pacific university at Forest Grove, Reed college, and Oregon Agricultural college. The annual oratorical contest is held as a means of presenting the

arguments for world peace and the contestants are selected from each institution after preliminary contests at the schools.

Goodwin spoke on "Evolving Peace" and received the first prize of \$75. The second prize was awarded to the O. A. C. entry. In the recent state oratorical contest the Eugene Bible university was placed second with the first honor going to O. A. C. The winning of the two high places in both of the major oratorical meets of the state among the colleges in one year by the local institution is a record seldom equaled since the organization of the contests.

JUNGLE TOWN IS BURNED

DEPUTY SHERIFFS APPLY MATCH TO HOBO SHACKS

Occupants of Buildings Across River Ordered to Leave City at Once on Pain of Arrest

Jungle town, a cluster of shacks, inhabited by Weary Wilkes, across the river near the Ferry street bridge, by a fire of the past year. Yesterday Deputy Sheriff George Croner led an arson squad that wiped out the village and the inhabitants were ordered to leave the city.

A series of store burglaries in Eugene during the past few nights have led the officers to the belief that it has been the work of transients and a raid was made on the jungles yesterday but none of the loot was found there.

Instead of stolen articles, Deputy Croner and his men found in two of the shacks where the occupants had begun the manufacture of moonshine but had not proceeded far enough to constitute a good case and the men, instead of being placed under arrest, were ordered to leave at once. As the jungle shacks were located on the county's ground the county court gave the officers directions to destroy them. Oil was poured over the shacks and the torch applied. The shacks were made principally of cut-off lumber and tin and no valuable materials were destroyed. Some of the men had been occupying the buildings all winter long.

One of the transients had a 16-gallon keg full of prune mash that had just begun to "work" and another man had six gallon cans full of the mash. It, too, was in process of fermentation, but no other appliances for making moonshine were found by the officers.

As the shacks began to go up in smoke the "whitties" with their blue-let rolls started making order pulled out for the south.

FIFTEEN REVOLVERS STOLEN

EUGENE GUN STORE ENTERED BY BURGLARS

Orion Confectionery Stand on Sixth Avenue West also Entered and Ransacked

Fifteen revolvers, valued at over \$200, were stolen from the Eugene gun store night before last and the police were notified that the Orion confectionery stand on Sixth avenue west near the Standard oil station was robbed of several dollars worth of watches and other goods.

Entrance to the gun store was effected through a window next to the alley. This let the burglars into the shop and it was then necessary to pry open an iron shutter over a window that led into the sales room. The revolvers, of several different makes, were placed in a drawer back of the counter the evening previous but seemingly were located easily by the burglars, which leads the officers to believe the work was done by someone who had been in the store at some time when the guns were put away and knew of their hiding place.

J. C. Macy, member of the night police force, discovered about 5 o'clock yesterday morning, that the window had been broken open and at once telephoned to Arthur Hendershot, owner of the store.

This is the second or third robbery that has occurred in this store during the past few years. Mr. Hendershot says he has always taken precautions against burglars, but they seem to be able to get in anyway. Besides the revolvers, the thieves took \$2 or \$4 in cash left in the till.

At the Orion candy shop, watches, rings and candy were stolen.
