

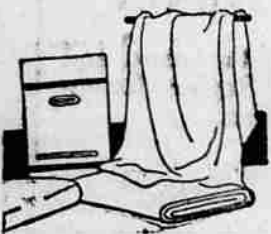

BASEBALL LEAGUE FORMED OF UPPER VALLEY CITIES

Six Teams Organized to Start
Season May 21

SUNDAY GAMES SCHEDULED

Eugene, Roseburg, Cottage Grove,
Yoncalla, Harrisburg and Goshen
Perfect New Organization

Organization of the Upper Willamette Valley Baseball League was perfected here at a meeting last evening between representatives of Eugene, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Yoncalla, Goshen and Harrisburg. The new six-team league will get under way with the first games of the season May 21 and according to the schedule now in preparation of drafting each team will play three games with each of the other cities of the league during the season. League games will be scheduled for Sunday only leaving the holiday day open for the teams to arrange for contests with outside teams.

Cash Bond Is Posted

The games for the opening day Sunday May 21 will be Yoncalla at Eugene, Goshen at Roseburg, and Harrisburg at Cottage Grove. Each team has posted a cash bond with the newly elected board of directors to guarantee the completion of the season's schedule and ample financial backing has been obtained in each of the cities to assure the success of the new league, according to the announcement of the promoters. The team representatives present at the meeting also went on record for clean baseball and the observance of all the rules and regulations that govern a well-organized professional league.

George J. Wilhelm, of Harrisburg, was elected president of the new organization with the following board of directors representing each city entered: H. H. Weiss, Eugene; R. C. Roney, Goshen; V. M. Peterson, Roseburg; S. S. Lasswell, Yoncalla; George M. Scott, Cottage Grove, and E. G. Huston, Harrisburg. An umpire from each of the six cities will be appointed before the opening of the season, the board announced.

Aviation Field Obtained
The Eugene team has obtained the use of the municipal aviation field for the local games and the grounds will be placed in condition and seating accommodations obtained for the patrons of the game here. A general admission charge of 35 cents has been agreed upon for all the cities of the league and boys under 17 will be admitted free as the promoters believe that the youngsters should have the opportunity to enjoy the thrill of the contests as the guests of the management.

Much enthusiasm has been manifested over the prospect of a season of professional league baseball in the upper valley according to the managers present at the gathering last night. All the teams have been organized and have already played several games with outside teams and are in condition to get away to a flying start at the opening.

O. A. C. ROOK NINE DEFEATS OREGON FROSH BY 7 TO 4

The Oregon Agricultural college rooks took the university freshmen down the line yesterday in the first of a two-game series, the final score being 7 to 4 in their favor. Johnston won from Howard Kinsey, thirteenth ranking player in the country, 6-1, 4-1, 6-2. Kinsey won a default from Vincent Richards, third ranking player and national junior champion, yesterday after Richards sprained his ankle. Richards had taken one set, 4-4 from Kinsey.

Dempsey, Carpenter and Ted Lewis Break Bread

30 SPORT WRITERS ATTEND

Kearns Forecasts Return Bout Between Dempsey and Carpenter in Europe Within a Year

LONDON, May 12.—In a room which serves as the monthly meeting place for the modern perpetrators of the Knights of King Arthur's Round-table, three of the most discussed knights of the roped arena, Jack Dempsey, Georges Carpentier and Ted (Kid) Lewis, and their managers and trainers and 30 British and American newspaper men had luncheon today as the guests of Dempsey and Jack Kearns, who are sailing tomorrow for New York.

At the luncheon, Kearns forecast a return fight between Dempsey and Carpentier in Europe within a year. He said that an agreement for a meeting between the two heavyweights in London or Paris before next May had been reached between himself and Francois Desamps, the man who guides the affairs of Carpentier.

TODAY MARKS ENTRY OF WOMEN IN TRACK EVENTS

Score of Meets Will Be Held From Coast to Coast

(By the Associated Press)
NEW YORK, May 12.—Woman's active entry into American track and field athletics will be made tomorrow in a score of meets to be held from coast to coast.

The principal meet will be held at the Oakmead School for girls in Mammonock, N. Y., with entries from north and south. The others will be staged at middle and far western institutions which have arranged a telegraphic contest under the direction of the recently organized national woman's track athletic association. In the telegraphic meet each team will hold a program on its own grounds and telegraph times and distances to Long Beach, Cal. There Howard will compare the records and announce the winner.

The women's association was established only a few months ago to prepare American women and girls for international competition, particularly for the first international women's meet at Pershing stadium in Paris next August, but eventually for the Olympic games of the future and to stimulate interest in the outdoor sports and standardize them.

Selection of Athletics Made Today
Selection of America's representatives in the Paris games will be made almost entirely from the result of tomorrow's contests.

European nations, especially England, France, Scandinavia and Germany are several years in advance of the United States in woman's athletic competition. The only international sport in which American girls have participated in swimming, excepting golf and tennis, and in the water they have beaten the stars of every other country.

Interest in woman's track and field debut will center on Mammonock. One hundred and two girls representing 22 different schools and colleges will compete in the largest field of American women athletes ever assembled.

Entries have been received as far south as the Florida state colleges from Winthrop Institute in South Carolina and from the progressive girls' schools strung along the coast northward from the Potomac to the New England states.
