BEST OF SALEM HIGH POINT MAN IN CYCLE HILL CLIMB

Event at Cottage Grove Attracts Hundreds; to Be Annual Event

Homer Best of Salem, was high point man and the Salem men placed in the most events in the motorcycle hill climb Sunday at Mount David, a short distance north of Cottage Grove just off the Pacific highway. Best took two firsts and one third. There were four events in the meet.

In the novice event for engines of 61 cubic inches running with chains Best placed first, negotiating the 122 feet in the 300 foot climb in 10 and two-fifths seconds. William G. Wade of Roseburg, came second with 102 feet to his credit in 11 and two-fifths seconds. Third place was taken by Ellis Miller of Roseburg with 91 feet and 9 inches in 9.4 seconds to his credit.

In the professional event for engines of 61 cubic inches, Wilfred Crane of Salem, won out with 161 feet to his credit in 12 and two-fifths seconds. Bill Davis of Eugene won second place with 153 feet in 14 and one-fifth seconds. Homer Best came third with 145 feet.

Best took first in the 80 cubic inch open event with a climb of 155 feet in 13 seconds. Yale Smith of Eugene took second place with 148 feet in 17 and two-fifths seconds. Wilfred Crane of Salem took third with 145 feet in 18 and four-fifths seconds.

In the 61 cubic inch novice event without chains Lewis of Roseburg took first with 58 feet and 5 inches in 10 and three-fifths seconds. Second place went to Hutchinson of Roseburg with a climb of 42 feet in 10 and two-fifths seconds. Third place was taken by Wade of Roseburg with 51 feet in 11 and one-fifth seconds.

Six riders were entered in each event and the best run out of three trials was taken as the record. The course at Mount David is 300 feet and is laid by those familiar with both tracks to be much better than the one at Capitano, California. It is planned to make the event an annual affair.

This year's event was sponsored by the Eugene and Roseburg automobile associations. A large crowd of automobilists and motorcyclists were attracted to the climb from all points in the valley and one car came from Vancouver, Washington.

The local club is now laying plans for the spy run set for June 17, at which time all clubs in the valley south of Salem will run up the McKenzie river. Albert Lundstrom, of the Eugene Vulcanizing works, refereed the contest, while Earl Vaughn, William Hodges and Dwight King acted as time keepers, and Homer Walker and Elmer Smith served as checkers.
