

OREGON DEFEATS WHITMAN SQUAD BY 7 TO 5 SCORE

Locals Rally From 5 to 3 Lead in Sixth and Win

GOOD BRAND OF BALL SEEN

Visitors Start Scoring First and Had Lead of 5 to 3 When Oregon Comes from Behind

Oregon defeated Whitman college yesterday in a fast ball game on the Cemetery Ridge field by a score of 7 to 5. Both teams played good baseball and although the offerings of Lefty Baldwin for the varsity and Knudson and Sherwood for the visiting team were freely batted in all corners of the lot, good fielding at critical moments kept the score down.

Whitman drew the first tally in the initial frame, and at the end of

the sixth inning was leading by a 5 to 3 score but Coach Bohler's squad started things off in the eighth and annexed three runs before they finished, having also scored one additional tally in the seventh, which brought the total up to 7. Baldwin tightened up after the sixth and held the Missionaries in hand until the end of the game.

Baldwin not only held the visitors to a single score after the sixth but he likewise won his own ball game by striking out a three bagger in the eighth inning with one man on, bringing in the two scores which Oregon led by at the end of the game. Foycroft of the varsity, played right field in Bill Saraby's place, also got a three bagger as did Matsuno for the visitors. Rich of the Missionaries scored a home run in the sixth but the bases were empty at the time.

Sherwood, who took the mound for the Whitmanites from the start of the game, was jerked in the eighth when the Oregon nine began to pound his offerings freely. Knudson, a brother of Carl Knudson, who played right field for Oregon for three years and graduated here last spring, then went in for the visitors but the game was safely put away before he began to work. Sherwood struck out five men while Baldwin was only able to fan two of the Missionaries.

Chamber Predicts Big Boom in World Trade

Conditions in Europe Is Topic of Day's Session

Revival in Business Field Contingent on Settlement of German Reparations Question

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Discussion of European conditions from the viewpoint of American trade and finances continued today to occupy both the day and night sessions of the annual convention of the American Chamber of Commerce. Several of the speakers today emphasized their conviction that the United States soon would be brought into closer economic relations with Europe and that with final settlement of the German reparations question, world business would boom.

Prominent among those holding optimistic view of the immediate future were Dwight W. Morrow of J. P. Morgan & company, J. H. Duffield, former chairman of the board of contract adjustment of the war department, and Silas H. Strawn of Montgomery Ward and company, Chicago.

C. E. Bedford, vice-president of the International Chamber of Commerce and president of the Standard Oil company, speaking at the night session, was of the opinion, he said, that Russia must be forced to acknowledge the "sanctity of private property" before the allies could admit her into the comity of nations.

Francis H. Simon, vice-president of the Guaranty Trust company, New York, also expressed his confidence that "representation of the United States by competent bankers and economists, at a conference in Europe to provide for the mobilization and distribution of international credits, would be desirable."

Announcement was made by President Duffield of the chamber that President Harding had arranged to address the convention tomorrow.

Woman Knocked Off Tractor

NEWPORT, Ore., May 17.—Miss Aline Guillema, aged about 45, was killed last night when she was knocked off a tractor over Teal creek, about six miles from South Beach, when driven by a train of the Pacific Spruce Corporation railroad. The logging train which was backing, struck the woman while she was crossing the trestle over a trestle 50 feet to the creek bed. She had been a resident of Beaver Creek, Lincoln county, since early childhood.

Fruit Crop Is Estimated

YAKIMA, Wash., May 17.—W. L. Close, district horticultural inspector, today forecast the 1922 fruit crop of Yakima and Kittitas as follows: Apples, 10,000 cases; pears, 25,000 cases; cherries, 100 cases; plums and prunes, 250 cases; cherries, 100 cases; grapes, 65 cases; melons, 300 cases. He also estimated potato production at 7,900 cases.
