SCHAEFER RETAINS HIS TITLE OF CUE CHAMPION

Jake Toys With Cochrane in
Final Block of Match

CHICAGO, May 18.—"Young Jake" Schaefer toyed with Weiker Cochrane in the final block of their world's championship 12.2 ball line billiard match tonight and retained his title by defeating the young Pacific Coast star 1509 to 1333. Schaefer won tonight's block, 500 to 414.

The story of tonight's block does not tell the real story of the champion's remarkable shooting in the final block. While he did not click off any remarkably high runs, his generalship in handling the balls brought repeated applause and left no doubt of his reliability, despite rather mediocre work the first two nights.

Schaefer could undoubtedly have ended the match sooner, for he was master at all times, but he elected to give the audience some thrills near the end by deliberately playing seemingly impossible shots.

As one spectator said, he seemed to be "making up shots." Once he fell down on one of those and Cochrane threatened for a moment with a run of 166.

Schaefer now holds unquestioned supremacy in the ball line world, having defended his title against Willie Hoppe and Cochrane, his best formidable opponents. He does not have to play again until fall, when he meets Roger Conti, French champion.

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 18.—While backing out of his garage today Coach R. B. Rutherford, of Oregon Agricultural college ran his car over his 18-month-old baby. The child was rushed to a hospital immediately and though both the rear and front wheels had passed directly across his body, no bones were broken and no internal injuries could be discovered. L. J.
