

WASHINGTON WINS FAST MEET BY SCORE OF 75-56

Events Full of Thrills and All Dope is Upset

LARSON TAKES 100-YARD

Beats Vic Hurley, Veteran Sprinter, By Bare Margin of Few Inches—Visitors Win Relay

In a fast meet, replete with thrills and dope upsets, the University of Washington trackmen defeated the Oregon team here yesterday afternoon in the feature event of the junior week-end program, by a score of 75 to 56. Washington's feat in capturing all three places in the 220-yard low hurdle event was the undoing of the Oregon chances and the lead of the Northerners was safe for the afternoon.

In a beautiful 100-yard dash, Ole Larson, the sensational sprinter of the Oregon team, who has been undefeated this year, beat Vic Hurley, the veteran sprinter of the purple and gold, to the tape by a bare few inches. From all appearances the sprint was a dead heat, but the judges agreed that Larson broke the tape in the lead. The time in this event, run in the face of a strong wind, was 13 flat. The judges and coaches agreed that with wind blowing the time might easily have been 9.4.

Sparrow High Man
Ralph Sparrow, of Oregon, com-

peting his first year on the varsity team, took three first places and was high point man with his total of 15 points. He won the pole vault at 11 feet 6 inches; the high jump at 5 feet 10 inches; and the broad jump at 21 feet 7 1/2 inches. Vic Hurley, of Washington, and George Strachan, of Oregon, tied for second place, each with 11 points each.

Not alone did Coach Edmondson's men upset the dope by winning all three places in the low hurdle, but the Northerners also captured first and second places in the 440-yard dash, which was a surprise due to the fact that Sundeaf, who won the race at Corvallis last week, against the Aggies, was expected to be rated among the leaders in this race at the finish tape. Vic Hurley, running in his true form, nosed out Del Oberbauer, of Oregon, in the 220-yard dash by 3 yards after Oberbauer had led him almost to the finish tape. The sprint was all full of thrills and the race was more than a scant few yards between the first and last runners.

Koopp Wins Two-Mile
A strong wind on the track during the afternoon is probably all that kept a few coast records from being at least equalled, for the time in all the sprints was the fastest that has been made in any Northwest meet held so far this year. Even the distance events were closely contested, although the time was not fast, considering what had been expected in the dual meet, and the predictions of the coaches and spectators.

Gay Koopp, of Oregon, and Zenger, of Washington, ran a pretty race in the two-mile event, the final quarter-mile sprint of the runners bringing the crowd to its feet when the two men ran a dead heat for three-quarters of the distance of this last lap. Koopp took a lead on the last home stretch and finished 19 yards in the lead.

Vic Hurley, of the purple and gold team, cut himself out for second place in the 220-yard dash, but he was low hurdler by slowing up when he saw he had an easy lead and allowing Anderson to cross the tape ahead of him. Anderson is indebted to Hurley for the race and the letter which he won as a result.

The Oregon team jumped in the lead from the start when Larson took first and Oberbauer third in the century dash. This lead was held until well along toward the last of the meet, the low hurdles, discus and javelin throwing the visitors in the lead by a fairly safe margin. In the pole vault Sparrow did not try for a record, contenting himself with first place at 11 feet 6 inches, which he cleared easily. Sparrow was not doped to win the high jump, which he took from Frankland, the Washington veteran, at a height of 5 feet 10 inches.

Washington Takes Relay
Washington took the lead in the relay from the first runner and held it throughout the race. The relay was run in 3:25.2. Both Washington and Oregon took seven firsts exclusive of the relay. The meet was attended by a large crowd and was run off in first

DEMPSEY GRABS RATTLER, UPSETTING MATCH PLANS

Kearns Had Hoped to Arrange for Bout With Wills

NEW YORK, May 20.—Chuck full of temperament since his European tour, Jack Dempsey, king of all pugilists, grabbed the rattler, Tex Rickard, late today, upsetting plans Tex Rickard had for a series of conferences at which he hoped to close with the champion for a match this fall with Harry Wills, or some other aspirant for the heavyweight crown.

Dempsey decided suddenly that he wanted to see "the folks," so he packed a few of his English cut clothes in a bag and went to the Grand Central station, where a big and impatient crowd cheered him on his way.

He still wore the monocle he brought back from England as a "joke on Jack Kearns," and was chuckling over the great marriage hoax he had perpetrated on the two big town newspaper men. The great hoax was an announcement made by his trainer, Teddy Hayes, and verified by the champion, that he was to be married to a mythical Edith Rockwell, of Boulder, Colo.

Kearns stayed here to negotiate with Rickard for a match.

Kearns Confers With Promoter
After the champion's departure, his manager, Jack Kearns, conferred with Tex Rickard and Frank Flounoy, promoters regarding the proposed championship contest.

Assuming that Jess Willard, the former title holder and Harry Wills, the New Orleans negro heavyweight, were the most formidable opponents for Dempsey, the promoters discussed possibilities of holding contests with both of them in August or September.

The promoters suggested that Dempsey meet Willard on or about August 15 and that, if successful, he could start training intensely after a week's rest, for a contest with Wills in the latter part of September.

Kearns, it was explained, was not impressed by the prospects with Willard and that he favored holding the contest with Wills in Europe. He was reported to have declared that he would not consent to a match with Wills in this country until he was certain that the contest would not be interfered with.

Kearns and the promoters will meet again Monday.
