The boys' roll room indoor baseball series has been completed. All throughout the season the games were exciting and interesting.

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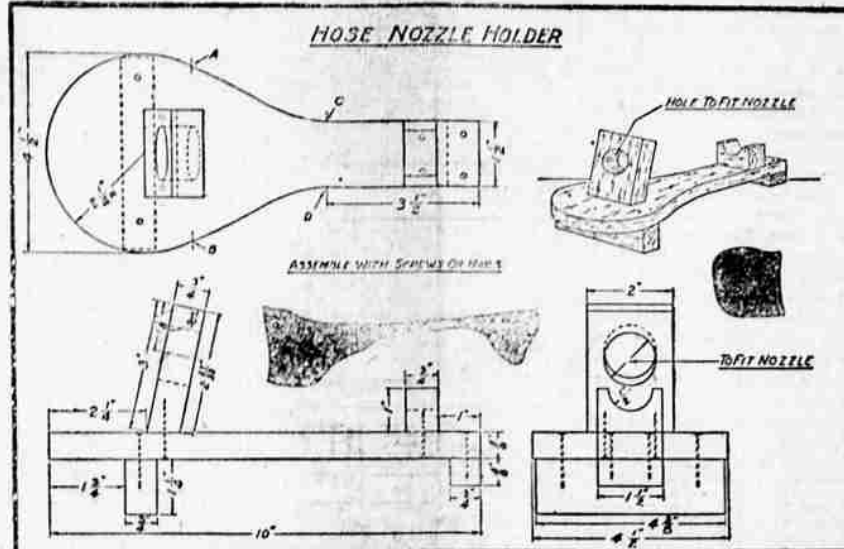
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TOOL - CRAFT BY FRANK I. SOLAR. HAND CRAFT PROJECTS. HOUSEHOLD MECHANICS.

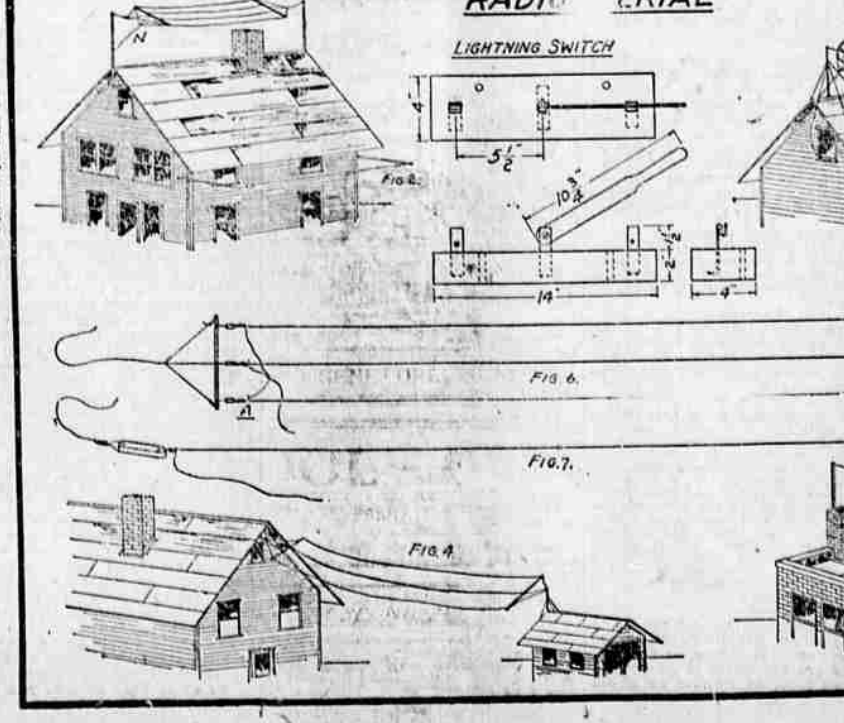

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NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON PARKS OPENS TODAY

One Big Idea of Meet is to Urge Series of State Parks

Thousands of Federal Employees in Washington Working on Seven-Hour Schedule

(By the Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 20.—The second national conference on parks which opens at Bear Mountain tomorrow will bring together most of the country's greatest experts on parks and public reservations.

The hope of this week's meeting is that the delegates will be able to emphasize the need of preserving the natural beauty and the historic spots, to be found in each state by making them into parks.
