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GEORGES READY FOR GREB

FRENCH BOXER ANXIOUS TO DE-
FEND HIS TITLE

PARIS, May 25.—Georges Carpentier is ready and anxious to defend his title of light heavyweight champion of the world against Harry Greb as soon as arrangements can be made. He desires to show Americans that, although beaten by a heavier man, he can hold his own with anybody of his weight in the world.

In the absence of Francois Desamps, Carpentier's manager, who is away in the country, no reply has been sent to the offer of Tex Rickard for a match between Carpentier and Greb for a purse of \$150,000, the battle to take place at Boyles' Thirty Acres, Jersey City in July or August.

Carpentier today said that it was his opinion no French promoter was likely to meet the offer of Rickard and that it was probable a fight with Greb would take place in the United States.

PITCHER HUBBELL INJURED

PHILLIES' MOUND MAN HIT IN
HEAD BY BATTED BALL

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—Wilbur Hubbell, pitcher to the Philadelphia National league team, today suffered a concussion of the brain and a fractured skull as the result of being hit

in the head by a batted ball driven by

T. Griffith in the first inning of the opening of a double-header between Brooklyn and the local team.

Griffith's drive struck Hubbell on the right side of the head and knocked him unconscious. He was later removed to a hospital, where his condition tonight was "as good as might be expected."

Hubbell is the second local player to be seriously injured this season. Goldie Kapp, the third baseman, suffered severe injuries several weeks ago in St. Louis when he fell into the players' dugout while going after a foul ball.

Hubbell came to the local club in 1920 from the New York Giants. His home is in Denver, Colo.

NORTHERN COLLEGES HELD

TO BLAME IN MEET SNARL

Stanford and California Refer
to Coast Conference Event

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—Hume for the failure of Stanford and California to enter the annual Pacific coast conference track meet was laid at the doors of the northern schools by college men here in commenting on a report from the University of Oregon last night that the meet may be abandoned because the southern teams have not entered for two years.

Stanford and California, both having strong track teams have entered the national intercollegiate championship meets at Harvard for the past two years and, in the coast meet was set for about the same time as the eastern affair, they were unable to compete with the westerers.

Managers and coaches of the two California schools say they endeavored at the conference meeting in Portland last December, to have the date of the coast meet set earlier than the Harvard meet that the southern teams could enter both. The northern conference delegates, however, refused to do this, according to the Californians, and set the meet for next Saturday at Seattle, the same date as the national meet at Harvard.

Two years ago the conference meet was held at Stanford and was won by California. Last year the California team won the national championship at Harvard.
