Captain Lloyd Doctor, Former San Francisco Newsboy to Address Young People This Afternoon

Lieutenant Colonel George H. Davis spoke on the subject of "Sleepy Christians" at the Salvation Army "crusade" meeting last night. The service was attended by a crowd which comfortably filled the Rankin hall.

The colonel stated that for every physical illness, there was a spiritual counterpart. "We have people whose bodies are bent with lumbago, and also people with spiritual lumbago, their souls being so crooked that they could hide behind a corker," he said. "The most detestable form of religious ailment is spiritual somnambulism."

Colonel Davis said that the church should be up to date in its methods. "I am told that some churches are employing 16th century methods in dealing with 20th century problems," he declared. "Somnolent Christians should 'come to' and recognize their obligations to the church and the world."

Tonight's service will begin at 8 o'clock with a song rally. Captain Anthony states that a feature of the song service will be the introduction of a brand new campaign chorus.

FARM HOUSE IS DESTROYED

HOME OF A. BRABHAM AT PLEASANT HILL BURNS

The farm house of Arthur Brabham at Pleasant Hill was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin yesterday morning about 10 o'clock. A small amount of furniture was saved but practically all of the clothing and personal effects of the family were lost. No insurance was carried. The loss is estimated at about \$1500 with no insurance.

Mr. Brabham was plowing in the field when he noticed smoke issuing from the roof of the building. The family was in the house at the time but did not notice the fire until it had gained such headway that all they could do was to save a few of the things.

Neighbors, attracted to the scene, could do very little to help as the fire house was a mass of flames in a few minutes.

TO OPERATE 'FRISCO BUS

R. C. STILLWELL WILL RUN SEMI-WEEKLY CARS

A new bus line between Portland and San Francisco is to be operated beginning May 30 by R. C. Stillwell of Eugene, who formerly drove a bus on the Marcola line. Two buses of the all-enclosed limousine type carrying 15 passengers each are to be operated to begin with, although more may be added if the business warrants such action.

The schedule provides for a bus twice a week and a running schedule of two and a half days from Portland to San Francisco. Overnight stops will be made at Grants Pass and Redding, California. Stops for lunch will be made at Eugene, Dunsmuir and Sacramento.

Headquarters of the line will be at the Central bus station in Eugene.

Mr. Stillwell will drive one of the buses and Glen Simon will be the driver of the other. Fares from Portland to San Francisco will be \$15 and between Eugene and San Francisco, \$12.50. No passengers will be carried between points in Oregon.
