ON EUGENE BIBLE CLASSUniversity Holds Annual Com-

THIRTY COMPLETE COURSES

Nine of Graduates Are Ordained as
Ministers of Christian Church at
Special Service Sunday Forenoon

Conferring of degrees upon the members of the graduating class of the Eugene Bible university was held last evening at the First Christian church at the closing event of a two-day program that marked the end of the year at the local institution. A class of 30 including 17 women received degrees from Dr. E. C. Sanderson, president of the school, following a program of singing and music including addresses by P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, and Abo F. Bennett, field secretary of the Bible university.

The musical program included an organ solo by Mrs. Mary E. Brown and songs by the Happy Harmony quartet, composed of students of the Bible university and a solo by Mildred Jessie Smith. The benediction was offered by Dr. E. C. Sanderson and Willam H. Baid had in prayer. The annual annual banquet was held early in the evening prior to the commencement program. The alumni members were addressed in the afternoon by Floyd A. Ross, of Walla Walla, Wash., at the auditorium of the Bible university.

MORSE CASE BANQUO'S
GHOST OF THE SENATE

DISCUSSION OF DAUGHTERY'S
ROLE IS REHEWED

Caraway and Watson Predict Attorney General's Mistake May Lead to Disruption of Cabinet

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The publication yesterday of a statement by the department of justice giving the circumstances which led up to the release of Charles W. Morse from Atlanta in 1912, formed the basis of a renewed discussion of Attorney General Daugherty's connection with the case in the senate today which two democrats, Senators Caraway, Arkansas, and Watson, Georgia, predicted that Mr. Daugherty's "mistake" in the present controversy may result in the dissolution of the cabinet.

Senator Caraway declared that previous statements of Mr. Daugherty, former Attorney General Wickard, Thomas H. Feltner, Mr. Morse's lawyer and others, had established that the man who had been released because of his physical condition and not as a result of other efforts. The petition, the signatures of which included some men who are now senators, was characterized by Mr. Watson as a "screen" behind which he said Mr. Daugherty was attempting to hide.

National Issue, Says Watson
The controversy has become a national issue, Mr. Watson said, adding that many republican newspapers had also attacked the attorney general and demanded that he quit office. The senator said that controversy had shown that Mr. Daugherty was not much more of a lawyer than Feltner, and practiced law in the same way—by lobbying.

Senator Watson further declared that the country no longer believed that the many promises made by the attorney general and would not pay heed to his threats to prosecute war time grafters until he really acted in the case.

"To begin to appear," the Georgia senator continued, "that it is hardly possible to punish right men any more. The little fellow without money or influential friends gets picked up and the big ones slip through. And it is bad enough to let them slip through without giving them help."

**DEEP MYSTERY SHROUDS
OSER-McCORMICK ROMANCE**

FATHER OF MATHILDE SAYS
DAUGHTER WILL NOT SAIL

Court Move Asking Order That Made
Mr. McCormick Guardian Be
Vacated Is Fresh Obstacle

CHICAGO, May 29.—Mystery and the possibility of a court battle today entered the romance of Mathilde McCormick, 17-year-old daughter of Harold P. McCormick, millionaire head of the International Harvester company and Max Oser, her Swiss raising master fiancé whose age has been variously given at from 45 to 53 years.

Despite the announcement in New York by the grand daughter of John D. Rockefeller that she would sail for Europe tomorrow, presumably to join Oser in preparation for their early wedding, her father from his home here, asserted that his daughter would not sail.

"The dispatches are a mistake," he said. "My daughter is not sailing."

Asking how that affected the wedding plans, he replied: "Not at all. The wedding plans remain just as they were."

Statement Viciously Interpreted
Whether this meant that he had vetoed her plan to return to Europe, or whether his daughter had changed her mind, Mr. McCormick would not say.

Meanwhile, a fresh obstacle to the marriage of the wealthy young American girl to a man almost three her age, was seen in a court suit, which an order that made Mr. McCormick the guardian of his daughter, might be vacated.

A technicality arose today when it was revealed that Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, who divorced Mr. McCormick several months ago, was not given what she regarded as proper legal notice of the proceedings.

According to the law, it was said, both parents must be served with notice of the petition for guardianship.

DAIRY ORDINANCE IS PASSED

ALL THOSE SELLING MILK WILL
BE LICENSEDTight Inspection of Places Where
Cows Are Kept to Be Made
Under New Law

All persons, firms or corporations selling milk in Eugene will hereafter be licensed and all places inside the city limits where cows are kept for commercial purposes or whose owners sell milk will be rigidly inspected, according to an ordinance passed by the city council last night. The license fee is set low for the "one-cow" dairyman, being but \$1 a year.

It is not the purpose of the ordinance, say the councilmen back of the measure, to derive revenue but to insure the health of the people of the city who use the milk, that comes from these dairies. All cows must be tested for tuberculosis and the premises must be kept clean, according to provisions of the ordinance.

There is a state law requiring dairy inspection but the newly enacted city ordinance provides a means of carrying it out. It was explained by M. M. Boney, manager of the Eugene Farmers' creamery.

The ordinance proposed a short time ago to prohibit the keeping of a cow within 50 feet of a residence without the consent of the owner of the residence, was passed.

18 RESCUED BY SUN DANCE

SURVIVORS ARE FROM VESSELS
GROUNDED BY GALE

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 29.—Eighteen survivors of a craft which was unable to withstand the gale which swept up the coast yesterday, were reported tonight to be aboard the shipping board steamer Sun Dance as it stood off Mayport awaiting an opportunity to dash across the jettied bar. Seven of them were survivors from the schooner Marian N. Cobb, which went aground today and was not expected to hold together through the night. Others were from launches which were unable to ride out the gale.

The gale played havoc with the St. Augustine shrimp fleet while the British schooner Perceval, bound from Nassau for this port for repairs, went ashore on St. George's bar near the mouth of St. John's river. The crew made shore in safety, however. A steam yacht was also reported in radio messages as in distress near the mouth of the river.

STRUCK BY ENGINE; LIVES

LITTLE GIRL, KNOCKED INTO
RIVER, IS UNHURT

SPOKANE, Wash., May 29.—Though knocked from a railroad trestle, 20 feet down into the swirling waters of the Spokane river, Lucile Erle, aged 18, of Dishman, near here, came through without so much as a scratch, and lost only her pocketbook.

The accident happened about 6 o'clock this evening. Miss Erle had been mistaken for the work train, got off as soon as the train had crossed the bridge and she had discovered her mistake. Suitscase in hand, she started back across the bridge, to get the right train.

Another locomotive, approaching behind her, knocked the grip out of her hand, and caused her to make a backswallow into the water. Railroad men, stopping the engine, rescued her when she came to the surface and cradled the branch of an overhanging tree, against which the current carried her.

Her battered suitcase, contents still intact, was recovered.

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
