PORTLAND CLUB RETAINS TWO YOUNGSTERS IN PLACE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31.—Jim Thorpe was unconditionally released tonight by the Portland baseball club. Thorpe was purchased from the Toledo club last winter for \$5000 cash. He was released to get the Portland club within the 30-player limit that becomes effective tomorrow.

Required to choose between Thorpe or a promising youngster, the Portland management decided for Green and Ike Wolff, young outfielders with a future. So Jim received his release.

Thorpe was handicapped at the outset of the season by a lame shoulder. He could hardly throw to the diamond and runners scored on short flies to his field. On top of that he lost his batting eye.

Thorpe was the highest priced ball player in the Pacific Coast league. His contract with Portland called for approximately \$1000 a month.
