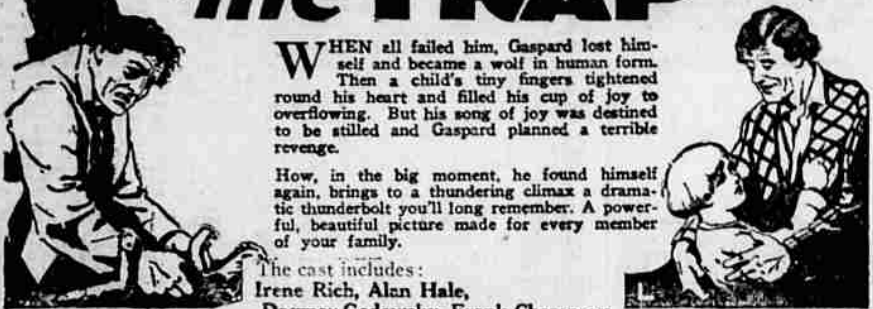

Kathryne Fry Stands Best in Recent Exams

TWO OTHERS GET MONEY

County School Superintendent's Office Offers Cash to Three Highest in Lane County

In order to stimulate the children finishing the eighth grade in Lane county to do better work, the county superintendent's office offered a first, second and third prize to the pupils making the highest grades in the May examination. A check of the grades earned shows that Kathryne Elizabeth Fry of district number 12, Santa Clara, won first place, getting \$81 points out of a possible 300. Second money goes to Pearl Monroe and third prize goes to Frances Laura Newlin, both of district 45, Cottage Grove, these girls making \$32 and \$31 points respectively.

The names of all persons who make an average of 90 per cent or over in all subjects are placed on a roll of honor which is posted in the county school superintendent's office. Out of almost five hundred applications only 18 qualified for a place on this roll. They are as follows, arranged according to rank:

Fifteen out of the 18 honor students come from schools having more than one teacher, showing that the child in the one-room school is at a disadvantage in comparison with the village and city child. He has less help from the teacher, has only eight months' school per year and often has a young inexperienced teacher.

Special stress has been placed this year by the county superintendent's office on writing, reading and English, including spelling common words, the formation of sentences, and neatness of work. Much improvement in the manuscript returned this year.

The credit for the honor students at Cottage Grove belongs to several teachers as departmental work is done there. Superintendent Moore. This city superintendent is O. W. Hays, the eighth grade teacher in district number 12, is Mrs. Minnie Morris in district number 43 is Miss Besse Fountain, in district number 46, Miss Myrtle Dale, in district number 19, Miss Lenora Hanson, in district number 8, Mrs. Kenneth Nielsen, in district number 129, Miss Edeline Caruthers, and district number 122, Miss Leota Humphrey.

Forty-four per cent of all the applicants received diplomas.

CORVALLIS BANKER IS FINED

ACCUSED OF BEING DRUNK WHILE DRIVING CAR

Woodcock and Chambers spent the rest of the night in the county jail appeared before Justice of the Peace Wells yesterday. They were unable to get in touch with their friends very soon afterward and spent a portion of the day yesterday in jail. They paid their fine late in the afternoon and were released.

Woodcock is a son of M. R. Woodcock, prominent pioneer capitalist of Corvallis.

PICTURES WILL BE LOANED

FORESTRY DEPARTMENT TO ASSIST IN PUBLICITY

Lane county scenic views will be loaned to the local chamber of commerce to be hung at the municipal auto camp and also to be placed on display at the booth that is to be maintained at the Portland auditorium during the coming rose festival. The pictures will be obtained through the co-operation of the United States forestry department. N. P. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, is now making arrangements

with the local chamber to have the pictures placed on exhibition.

The photographic views that have been obtained by the government officials depict many of the beauty spots of Lane county and will be an attractive feature of the sportmen's show at Portland and will have much publicity value at the auto camp, according to officials of the chamber of commerce.

TRUCK OWNERS ARE FINED

LOADS ON VEHICLES HAULED ON HIGHWAY TOO HEAVY

Inspector McMahon, Who Caused Arrests Explains Several Phases of Traffic Law

Manured Bros., wood dealers, and C. O. Forrester of this city, were each fined \$10 in the Eugene justice court yesterday on a charge of carrying too heavy a load on their trucks.

J. J. McMahon, state traffic inspector, who caused the arrests, advises all truck owners and drivers to acquaint themselves with the provisions of the law in this regard. He said that trucks that have a total tire width of 30 inches or less are allowed to figure loads on a basis of 600 pounds to the inch and less than that width 500 to the inch, each axle to be figured by itself.

In further explaining the traffic law the inspector said that headlights must be dimmed when a car meets any other vehicle at night; pedestrians using the highways must walk on the left hand side; persons operating cars for hire or those hired to drive a car must have a chauffeur's license; trucks hauling for hire outside of incorporated cities or towns must pay 50 cents an inch for every inch of tire bearing surface over and above the regular license.

SCHOOL ELECTION COMING

MEMBERS OF P. T. A. TO ACT AS OFFICIALS

Money Usually Paid Judges and Clerks to Be Turned Over to Association Treasury

The money that is usually allowed to judges and clerks at the annual school election will this year be turned over to the treasury of the parent-teacher associations. Members of these associations will act as officials at the annual school election in Eugene June 19 at which time a director will be chosen to succeed Mrs. F. L. Shinn, whose term expires this year. There will be a polling place at each of the grade school buildings, according to announcement yesterday by O. H. Jones, clerk of the Eugene district.

Mrs. C. Roy Loomis, a well-known worker among the parent-teacher associations and who was endorsed at a recent meeting of the associated council of the associations, is the only candidate mentioned for director at present.

ECONOMIC DATA IS FILED

SURVEY WILL SOON BE COMPLETED IN EUGENE

Employment statistics of Eugene including data as to number of employees, average rate of pay, and hours of labor, which are being compiled by the chamber of commerce with the co-operation of the department of economics of the University of Oregon will soon be completed. The information has been requested by the United States government for the use of the unemployment conference and also for the national bureau of economic research. The report was to have been submitted by June 1 but the work has been delayed.

All local business establishments and other employers of labor in Eugene will be listed as to the number on the payroll and other data concerning the economic conditions prevailing here. The research may later be broadened to include other Lane county cities.
