ANNUAL AWARDS MADE AT UNIVERSITY ASSEMBLY

More Material for Football and Track Teams Are Credited By Huntington and Hayward

Installation of student body officers for the school year 1922-23 and the presentation of various athletic, debate and music awards were the features of the last meeting of the association of the University of Oregon held in Villard hall yesterday.

"Shy" Huntington presented four men with "O" blankets in recognition of four years' service as athletes to the university. The men are "Spick" Leslie, who has won three letters in both football and baseball; Matt Howard, three-year letterman in football; Marc Latham, who has been a basketball star for four years; and Francis Heller, three-year letterman in basketball and also a two-year letterman in baseball.

"Shy" made short talks on the achievements of each of these men and also gave a short speech on next fall's football prospects. He spoke very optimistically regarding next year's team, but urged that the students interest more men in the university so that material for future teams might be obtained.

Hayward also made an appeal for more prospective athletes from the graduating classes of the high schools. Bill presented Delta Tau Delta with the cup offered for the winners of the recent inter-fraternity track meet and awarded Ben Virden a

small gold shoe for winning the greatest number of points in the meet.

Professor C. D. Thorpe, head of the department of public speaking and debate, presented 15 awards to debaters and orators. Claude Robinson, sophomore, was given the \$25 check presented each year to the winner of the alumni contest. Robinson was winner in the contest held in Villard hall Wednesday night. David Graham, of Eugene, made the presentation speech.

Klaine Cooper and Wanda Daggett received shields mounted with the Oregon seal in recognition of three years' work in debate.

Res Underwood, director of the University orchestra, presented orchestra members with orchestra pins, and John Mark Evans, director of the girls' glee club, presented the members of the girls' glee club with awards in the form of pins. The men's glee club will be given their pins later.

Tuesday Mr. Swain will be at the Puhner place, near Cottage Grove, at 10 A. M., and at the Raymond place, also near Cottage Grove, at 2 P. M.

Excellent results have been noted by County Agent Whitney wherever the mole and gopher campaign has been extended, also wherever the poison has been set out for the gophers, and he says the farmers are more than satisfied with the work.

HEALTH RECORDS ARE GOOD

REPORT SHOWS LANE COUNTY ABOVE AVERAGE

Lane county health records for the month of May have been excellent, according to Dr. Seth M. Kerron, city and county health officer, who has compiled the reports showing that but few cases of contagious disease have been listed during the month. The few cases reported were of the milder type of chicken-pox and mumps and the general health conditions have been far above the average.

The month of May is usually the low record month of the year in reports of contagious disease but the past month has indicated a better average health situation than in any month of the past. The Lane county health records are among the best of any community of the state, according to a comparison with the lists from other cities.

Slashings Season Is Closed

FRUIT NOT THINNED ENOUGH

THIS IS GIVEN AS MAIN CAUSE FOR SHORTAGE

Trees Have Been Weakened Because of Over-bearing Says Inspector Stewart

There will be nothing like a full crop of fruit in the upper valley this year except prunes, said C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, yesterday. A number of apple orchards that have come under the observation of the inspector will bear fairly well, he said, but cherries and other standard crops will be short.

Over-bearing and lack of proper thinning during the past two years is given by the inspector as the main cause of short crops this year, the trees having been weakened, and in case of cherries lack of pollination is thought to be the cause. In orchards near where there is kept a large number of bees the inspector says he finds that the crop is better than in localities where there are none. Bees are known to be one of the best mediums of pollination known to fruit men, he said.

No complaint can be had this year on account of frosts because there have been none at all during the spring that have been severe enough to harm any varieties of fruit, said Inspector Stewart.

Klan Member Found Guilty
RAKERSFIELD, Cal., June 1.—William Pickens, a member of the Ku Klux Klan, was found guilty by a superior court jury of assaulting and robbing Clyde Riekey, a taxi cab driver. The prosecution contended Pickens was one of four masked and robed men who beat and robbed the chauffeur. Pickens was the first to be tried of five men indicted recently in connection with night rider activities.
