

BIBLE SCHOOL OPENS JUNE 5

VACATION SESSIONS FOR CHILDREN ANNOUNCED

Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist churches to be meeting places—Classes held in morning

Daily vacation Bible schools in the Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist churches will begin Monday June 5. The Baptist church would have joined with the others but their plans for their vacation were so advanced that the combination could not be effected this year. The Baptist church will join with the others, however, in the closing pageant, which promises to be the biggest event of its kind ever staged in the city. In the combined school the juniors and intermediates will meet at the Presbyterian church at the corner of Pearl street and Tenth avenue and the Kindergarten and primary at the Methodist church on Willamette street between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues.

The general supervision of the entire school will be in charge of Mrs. W. M. Case who will also direct the work of the Junior and Intermediate divisions. The selection of Mrs. Case, who was responsible for the school at the Presbyterian church last year, insures the success of the combined school.

Mrs. P. G. Youngs will have charge of the primary division which will consist of the first, second and third grade pupils. A kindergarten department to care for the little tots of three, four and five year olds will be added to the plan for this year. This was decided at the meeting of the Vacation School board yesterday afternoon. The person in charge of this department will be announced later.

Miss Agness Dunlap will be in charge of the Bible story hour and will have charge of the dramatization and pageantry work. Miss Marian Andrews who has been attending Columbia university and doing settlement work in New York City will assist Mrs. Case in the executive department. Miss Madge Calkins, who has been supervisor of music in the Roseburg schools the past year, will be the pianist for the school. The recreation period each day will be supervised by W. P. Walters, boys' secretary of the Y. M. C. A., assisted by Ray Murray, in charge of the physical work at the "Y."

Parents are advised that children are cordially invited to attend any of the schools. The session opens at 9 o'clock in the morning and closes at 11:30. No charges of any kind will be made.

The general management of the Daily Vacation Bible schools has been placed by the Council of Religious Education in the hands of a board consisting of one representative of each of the cooperating churches. It is composed of E. C. Neffron, chairman, L. P. Putnam, secretary-treasurer, Scott Hayes and C. A. Hoyt. This board at a meeting yesterday afternoon with Mrs. Case and the pastors of the cooperating

churches practically completed all arrangements for the opening of the schools Monday.

MANY CARS ARE STOPPING

CHARGE OF FIFTY CENTS HAS LITTLE EFFECT

FINISHING UP CROSSING

GUTHRIE AND COMPANY PUTTING LAST WORK

Highway on Approaches at McVeigh Point Levelled and Railings Have Been Built

Guthrie and company, who had the contract for the dirt work on either side of the overhead crossing at McVeigh Point, on the highway three miles south of Eugene, are now completing the work left over from last fall. The company having been at work for a month or more on the grading at the south approach.

The workmen encountered considerable rock which delayed operations longer than anticipated. The railings have been built at the sides of the fill at each end of the crossing and the roadway on the approaches has been levelled for the macadam.

A. C. Mathews of Eugene, has the contract from the state highway commission to lay the macadam and it will be paved when the ground has settled sufficiently. This work will be done perhaps next year as it is the rule of the commission to wait but a year after any fill is macadamized.

WIRE CREW HAS FINISHED

LINE STRUNG FROM SPRINGFIELD TO COTTAGE GROVE

The wire crew of the Mountain States Power company, at work stringing the transmission wires from the main plant at Springfield to Cottage Grove has reached the latter place but there will be a delay of perhaps two weeks before current is supplied Cottage Grove for the reason that the sub-station equipment has not yet arrived and there is yet a mile of line to be built around the Booth-Kelly mill pond at Springfield.

The California-Oregon Power company, on whose poles the Mountain States company's wires are strung, will erect two steel towers to carry the wires over the mill pond but these will not be erected for some time and meanwhile the Mountain States company will string its wires on a temporary line of poles around the pond.

LUMBER OUTPUT BOOMING

PRODUCTION IS 12 PER CENT ABOVE NORMAL

Of Week's Shipment of 125 Mills, 33 Per Cent Went Out By Water, Says Report

The production of lumber by the mills of the West Coast Lumbermen's association gained 7 per cent during the past week when it reached 12 per cent above normal. The report just issued by the association for the 125 mills of the Northwest shows that new business was 10 per cent above production and shipments 8 per cent below new business.

Of all new business taken during the week 36 per cent was for future water delivery. This amounted to 36,591,197 feet, of which 25,354,363 feet was for domestic cargo delivery and 10,336,834 feet for overseas shipment. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 2133 cars.

S. P. MAY ENTER NEWPORT

PLAN SAID TO BE TO USE SPRUCE RAILWAY

Passengers Could Be Landed in Heart of Coast Resort City if Project Is Carried Out

The people of Newport are confidently expecting that Southern Pacific trains will be running into that city by the time the summer outing season begins, according to Eugene residents who have lately visited that resort.

It is said to be the plan of the railway company to divert its passenger trains over the spruce project railroad built by the government during the war, thus enabling it to land its passengers in the heart of Newport.

Such a report has been in circulation at Newport for a long time, say those who have been in the coast town lately, and the presence there recently of Southern Pacific officials who went over the spruce railroad and spent some time in Newport with blue prints gave rise to a strong belief that the plans will be carried out in a short time.

No confirmation of this report could be obtained from local officials of the railway company.
