charges. Maybe they have discovered they cannot pass it and are going to join the discussion from this side, let the bill fail in conference, and say it was a Democratic filibuster and they were unable to get it through this session."

Says Emergency Bill Lost Trade—Senator Simmons said that as a result of the emergency tariff the United States had lost half its trade with Canada, its best customer and he predicted that under this bill it would lose more.

"I am advised," he said, "that the authorities of Canada are preparing to promulgate a new preferential tariff in behalf of Great Britain in which that country will be given a preferential of 50 per cent over the United States and other countries."

Tariff Bloc Aids Overthrow—With the aid of nine democrats, the republican tariff bloc overthrew the committee on the question of the duty on manganese ore, the senate reporting, 35 to 19, a committee amendment to put it on the free list.
