STEFANSSON IS HONORED

EXPLORER AWARDED HONORARY DEGREE BY IOWA U. IOWA CITY, Ia., June 5.—Dr. Vilhelmur Stefansson, explorer of the frozen north, discoverer of a race of blond Eskimos and famous alumnus of the University of Iowa, was awarded an honorary degree of LL.D. at the 1922 graduating exercises of the university held here today.

The degree was awarded the explorer by President Walter A. Jessup and was presented by Professor G. T. Patrick of the philosophy department. Stefansson was graduated from the University of Iowa, liberal arts college, in 1902. Since that time he has won recognition as an authority on Arctic exploration and ethnological subjects by seven extended scientific expeditions into the Far North.

NEW YORK SYSTEM FAVORED

OREGON PRIMARIES EXPECTED TO BE CHANGED

Plan as Suggested Provided for Nominating Convention, but Any Others May Run for Office

The New York state primary plan is considered very favorably by prominent Republicans of Oregon, as a substitute for the present primary law of this state, according to some of the leaders of the party in Eugene. The Lane county Republican central committee at its meeting Saturday went on record as being opposed to the present primary nominating law and in favor of seeking a suitable substitute, but just what this substitute will be has not been determined. New York's state primary plan provides for a state convention for writing a party platform and recommending candidates but not prohibiting others from running.

Nearly every Oregon county Republican central committee that has organized since the primary election has gone on record as disapproving of the present primary system in this state and it is a foregone conclusion, say leaders of the party, that a strong attempt will be made to amend it.

PILOT OF WELSH PRINCE ON TRIAL FOR SHIP LOSS

FREIGHTER SUNK IN COLUMBIA RIVER ON MAY 28

Captain Sullivan Declares Iowan Gave Confused Whistle Signals Resulting in Collision

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Captain Edward Sullivan, pilot of the British freighter Welsh Prince, which was sunk in the Columbia river above Astoria May 28 with loss of seven lives after collision with the American freighter Iowan, was placed on trial today before the United States steamship inspection service board here, and Captain A. R. Pearson, pilot of the Iowan was to be tried later. The trials followed the filing of formal charges against the pilots by Captain E. S. Edwards, inspector of hulls and John E. Wynn, inspector of boilers, who yesterday concluded an investigation of the wreck.

Testifying at his trial this morning, Captain Sullivan declared the accident was caused by a confusion of whistle signals. He said the up-bound Iowan gave two blasts.

Erskine Wood, attorney for Captain Pearson, insisted that the Iowan gave only one blast. Captain Sullivan said that when the Iowan gave two blasts, signalling that it would pass green to green—that is each vessel to keep to the left side of the channel, the Welsh Prince proceeded with this intention until the Iowan whistled a second signal, this time one blast, which would have passed the ships red to red, or with each ship at the right of the channel. The Welsh Prince could not maneuver such a passage, Captain Sullivan said, and it immediately gave a danger signal, a series of short blasts, stopped the engines and ordered them put astern. With no loss of time, the pilot of

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the Welsh Prince declared his vessel gave two blasts, a signal that it would have to keep to its course and pass starboard to starboard.

Captain Hugh H. Hill, master of the Welsh Prince, corroborated the testimony of Captain Sullivan. He declared the Iowan's first signal was distinctly two blasts.

Captain A. R. Pearson, pilot of the Iowan, testifying this afternoon, declared that while about a mile and a half to a mile and a quarter from the Welsh Prince he signaled one whistle blast, indicating a port to port passage, and that he received no response. He said he repeated this signal at one half a mile distance, and received in reply a series of short blasts, indicating a danger signal which he answered. He said he then reversed his engine.
