LOUISA JANE KELLEY DIES

PASSES AT COTTAGE GROVE FOLLOWING LONG ILLNESS

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., June 5.—Mrs. Louisa Jane Kelley died Saturday evening at her home here following a lingering illness. She had been an invalid for six years and her condition had been serious following an attack of influenza. The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon from the chapel, Rev. S. Hamrick officiating. Interment was in the Taylor-Lane cemetery.

Mrs. Kelly was born June 20, 1848, in Des Moines, Iowa, where she was married September 4, 1867, to George W. Kelley, who died here a few years ago. Of six children born to this union none survive. Three brothers and three sisters survive, as follows: James Walker, of Washington; John Walker of Ft. Madison, Iowa; Charles Walker of Cottage Grove; Mrs. Henry Eaton of Ogden; Mrs. George Griffith, Lowell, Iowa, and Mrs. T. B. Myers of southern Oregon.

Mr. Rissue was killed instantly Friday afternoon in the logging camp of the Buck Creek Lumber company, when struck by a steel line, which was released by the breaking of a pulley. His neck and left arm were broken and the face mutilated. Pat Brown, employed nearby, also was struck and rendered unconscious, but sustained no serious injuries.

Mr. Rissue, who was 30 years of age, was born here and had lived his entire life here. Surviving relatives are the father and five brothers, William, Albert, Dave, Frank and Reuben, all residents here except Dave, who lives in Washington.
