DAILY MARKET REPORT OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—Market for butter continues to show an active tone for so-called state cube extras with sales around 345,000 a pound general. The latter appears to be the extreme limit.

San Francisco has entered the market for butter here and some shipments are reported being made to that section, while sales to the Los Angeles market continue of quite fair volume.

LIGHT POWERS REPORTED EASIER Market for light weight fowls is somewhat easier with the bulk of the business here at 15c a pound. Heavy hens and broilers continue to sell well but light weighters are slow. No demand at all for ducks.

MISSISSIPPI TOMATOES ARRIVE First carload of Mississippi tomatoes of the season was due this morning with supplies reported in excellent condition. The trade in general was quoted at 83 for four-bucket crate. Market has been bare of good stock.

SUGAR ADVANCE IN EFFORT Another advance of 10c per hundred pounds in the price of all grades of refined sugar is now effective in the Portland trade, following a similar rise at Pacific Coast refining points. Other advance forecast.

STRAWBERRY MARKET GLUTTED Market for strawberries was again glutted. On the Farmers' market sales of good stuff were made at \$1.00 early in the day, and about 15c a bushel at 7:30 a. m. for local stock. No demand at all for any other price. California stuff sacrificed with enormous loss to wholesalers.

GOOD MEATS ARE FINDING CALL While ordinary to poor stuff is slow and inclined to weaken, the market for fancy top calves of proper weight is in excellent call around 13c generally, although some lamb-ers are shown practically higher. Hoses are firm at 18c for top blockers. Lamb-ers steady at 20@22c.

J. H. DARRAH PASSES AWAY DEATH OCCURS AT HIS HOME NEAR HARRISBURG HARRISBURG, Ore., June 7 (Special to the Register).—The death of J. H. Darrah occurred at his home last Friday morning, following a stroke of paralysis two weeks ago and an illness dating since last October. The funeral services were held at the home in the Rowland neighborhood, three miles east of here, at nine o'clock Sunday morning. Rev. Cook, of Halscy, was in charge. The remains were taken to Salem where interment took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, several auto loads of friends and neighbors going down.

James H. Darrah was born in Belfast, Ireland, May 21, 1855. He immigrated to this country when in early manhood and took up his residence at Pittsburg, Pa., where he was married to Margaret Stewart. They moved to this state in 1891, settling in Portland. There he was employed by the O. W. R. railway for a number of years. About three years ago he came to Harrisburg and took up his residence on the farm east of town. He was a farmer for a few years before he retired.

Besides his wife, Mr. Darrah is survived by one daughter, Miss Anna Darrah, of Portland; one son, Charles, also of Portland, and two brothers, William and Charles, of Pittsburg, Pa. SAMUEL P.
